December 1, 2006 marked the 25th anniversary of World AIDS Day. Across Palm Beach County there were many activities. COMPASS, the Bisexual and Transgender Lesbian. Gay, organization in Palm Beach County, held their annual candle-light vigil. This year the focus was "Twenty-five Years Later, Still No Cure". The backdrop of the event was nine blocks of the AIDS Quilt which lined the walls of the organization. People took time to reflect on those that have passed away. Names of those that have succumbed were read, while music played in the background. A new panel was inducted this year, which brought a realization that people are still dying from this disease. Eric Miller is the Senior HIV Testing Counselor at COMPASS and the co-chair of the Names Project South Florida Chapter as well as the Southeast Regional Names Project Foundation representative. He was able to deliver quilt panels to COMPASS and various other organizations across the county. Eric Miller reflected, "It is important to remember those that have passed, and honor their lives. We must also encourage those in

the fight to have a voice, and to continue to advocate. We need to get back out there and advocate like we used to. The reality is we are still burying friends. People are still dying. HIV continues to spread and does not discriminate".

United Deliverance Community Center held an event with Devon Robinson X, a local celebrity who motivated young people to get tested through his monologue entitled, "God Did Not Give Me HIV". Also, an outstanding skit on HIV among young people written by Caroline Williams-Hill of United Deliverance was performed at the event.

Several events were held out in the Glades, including a health fair, a testing and counseling day, a candle light ceremony, and much, much more. Family Unity Week was held at Palm Beach Community College's Dolly Hand Cultural Art Center in Belle Glade. The theme this year was "Fighting for a Generation without AIDS".

Look Who's Talkin'

Tuija Tuittula-Pease RN Care Manager Positive Health Care

I was born in Finland. When I was 30 years old I left for Africa for the first time, to work for a Finnish organization giving aid to the Somali department of health. I worked in Somalia for four years in the eighties. Somalia is a poor country located in the Horn of Africa, on the north-east side of the continent. I worked as a Registered Nurse at tuberculosis (TB) clinics, training local health care personnel to treat patients with this infectious disease that is still common in many third world countries.

During this time I became more and more aware of the increasing devastation HIV/AIDS was wreaking in Africa and to understand how widespread HIV was becoming. The political violence in Somalia was making serious work more difficult for me even though foreigners were not targets. I met my American-born husband during my stay in Somalia

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and although we both loved Africa, and to this day long to return, we moved on to work in Sri Lanka. We are still in contact with some ex-coworkers that still live in Somalia, and it continues to be an unstable country.



Sri Lanka is an island nation in South Asia. I worked there as a sanitation and health adviser to the health department. Although there is a rebel faction called the Tamil Tigers fighting for political control this was not a threat to me since Sri Lankans are very friendly to foreigners. They knew we were there to help. Due to my interest in fighting the spread of HIV/AIDS I added a component on sexually transmitted diseases, with an emphasis HIV/AIDS, to the sanitation and health education program. The Sri Lankan health department was very open to my suggestions and HIV/AIDS information became an important piece of the program from then on. I feel very positive about my contribution. My husband and I wanted to return to Africa but changes in funding for many health programs there reduced the number of full time jobs, encouraging short-term consultancies instead. We ended up moving to Florida, attracted to the southern part of Palm Beach County because its diverse population. of

I worked as a health education supervisor for an organization called DATA. We went to the jails, boot camps and substance abuse treatment facilities to test

Many inspiring speakers were present including pastors from Churches United to Stop HIV (CUSH), which is a tri-county organization. One of the main organizers, Lorenzo Robertson, from Palm Beach County Health Department reflected on World AIDS Day, "HIV still greatly impacts the community, but we have not been able to get the community out, as much as in years past. Perhaps this is due to complacency and apathy. Attendance is way down. We are trying to figure out how we can get the urgency back that the community once had. People don't think it is an emergency any more, but that is not so." HIV prevention outreach efforts are funded to target very specific populations. Mr. Robertson believes we need to go back to doing the prevention efforts for the entire population, because AIDS does not discriminate.

On World AIDS Day the Comprehensive AIDS Program (CAP) collaborated with many organizations. Their theme was "The Virus Is 100% Preventable". The events were very successful throughout the county. In the Glades, Eugenia Elijah focused on prevention outreach. In the south of the county Sharon Hollis and Vela Massenat launched the Learn, Know, and Connect Campaign with a Highway Hold-Up, in which they conducted Risk Assessments.

If the participant answers yes to one of the questions they are recommended for HIV testing. In the north part of the county Debra McCray and a host of volunteers wrapped gifts at Kmart in Lake Park in conjunction with giving out HIV information. In Riviera Beach, City Councilwoman, Norma Duncombe donated four gift cards for the winners of a World AIDS Day poster contest at the Boy and Girls Club. Mayor Brown presented the gift cards to the winners. The 45th Flea Market Administration and local vendors agreed to have condom distribution and

and educate people on HIV/AIDS. I started with Positive Healthcare a little over five years ago. Positive Healthcare is part of the AIDS Healthcare Foundation which is the biggest HIV organization in this country. In addition, AIDS Healthcare works in 16 different countries. The organization was started in California. Positive Healthcare functions as a disease management organization. In Florida we have a contract with the state through Medicaid/Medipass.

As a registered nurse most of my contact with my patients is through home visits and the telephone. I educate my patients on the importance of medication adherence, a healthy life style, exercise and good nutrition. This is important for everyone, but particularly for people struggling with a chronic illness. I educate my patients on how best to manage their illness and treatment. I facilitate communication between healthcare professionals and patients. I recommend screenings and tests that may be important for the patient. Positive Healthcare also has non-profit pharmacies and the medications are received through the mail. At Positive Healthcare we go beyond our assigned tasks -- from filling pillboxes to acting as advocates for our patients by talking to hospital or clinic staff to make sure they get prompt treatment and medications. Often receive important patients letters from government health programs that they do not understand. I assist in explaining what they need to do. I also educate patients on their rights. We work closely with HIV case managers and have a working relationship. very good

The patients that I work with have many challenges. One of the greatest is the economic challenge. These days it is hard to live on the amount one receives through Supplemental Security Income. Patients on SSI do not have enough to pay for their basic needs like rent and utilities. Most of my patients have a very low income. Another challenge for my patients is

finding providers that accept Medicaid reimbursement. There is also a lack of particular physician specialists -- ear, nose, and throat, orthopedic surgeons and dermatologists, for example -- that Medicaid eligible patients have access to in Palm County. For some of my patients substance abuse is a very real struggle. As a nurse that is trying to assist them in disease management this poses a challenge. When someone is addicted to drugs and/or alcohol their focus is on satisfying that addiction and not on taking their HIV drugs. There are plenty of substance abuse treatment centers throughout Palm Beach County, available to help people with their additions. Also the issue of stigma continues to be a challenge for the HIV/AIDS community.

At times I am discouraged and frustrated, feeling that I am not able to get my patients access to the healthcare that they need. I see how hard my patients are struggling to make ends meet and to stay healthy. It is an uphill battle for them.

I believe that if you try your best in everything you do, there will be a good result. There are many days that I am very happy, then others when I feel like I am going backwards. I feel this work is very important. It is so vital that our community does not let people living with the virus suffer alone.

There are many people that I know that have been infected for over 20 years who are living a full life. Most often those people are taking their medications and are knowledgeable about the importance of staying with medical treatment. Some patients have found that seeking counseling has helped them tremendously. Also

they typically understand how to not become reinfected. Being re-infected is when a person infected with HIV becomes exposed to different strains of the virus. The healthiest patients I know have safe sex in order to avoid re-infection and other STDs. Also a balanced diet, including lots of vegetables and fruits, and avoiding too many fatty foods is important. Most things are all right to eat, but only in moderation. As people are living longer with the virus they are developing other chronic illnesses, like diabetes, high cholesterol, as well as heart and kidney problems. A balanced diet will help to avoid this.

I am pleased to be doing exactly the work that I envisioned for myself. I hope that I can continue doing this for many years in the future.

Do you want to learn how to more effectively communicate, participate and lead others in this effort?



Chicken and Wild Rice Soup

6 oz. package of long grain and wild rice mix, prepared as package directs

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

8 oz. boneless, skinless chicken breast halves, chopped

1 medium onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

2 cans, (14.5 oz each) chicken broth

½ tsp. dried tarragon, crushed

½ tsp. dried thyme, crushed

½ tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. ground black pepper

1 can evaporated milk

3 tbsp. cornstarch

Heat vegetable oil in large saucepan. Add chicken, mushrooms, chopped onion and garlic; cook, stirring occasionally, for 5-8 minutes or until vegetables are tender and chicken is no longer pink. Add rice, broth, tarragon, thyme, salt and pepper; bring to a boil over mediumhigh heat. Combine small amount of evaporated milk and cornstarch in small bowl; stir until smooth. Add to saucepan with remaining evaporated milk. Cook, stirring occasionally, for 3-5 minutes or until soup is thickened. Garnish with scallions and almonds. Serves 6.

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
