HIV Test Sites Fan Out to Everyday Places People Go

Finding and helping the estimated 2,000 people in Palm Beach County who don't know they are infected with the virus that leads to AIDS should not be an insurmountable task, the organizers of National HIV Testing Day contend.

Pastor Tony Drayton, who is working with them, agrees.

"We say these people or those people," the pastor of St. James Missionary Baptist Church said. "It's not these or those. It's us."

We go to beauty salons and barber shops, parks and sports bars, coffee houses and community centers, he says.

On Friday, such places are among 32 sites in Palm Beach County where volunteers and health workers will go in their most ambitious push yet to help people get tested for HIV, as well as hepatitis and other infectious diseases.

The effort also will take them to more churches and involve more parishioners than ever before.

The stakes are high, health officials say. More than 7,300 people in Palm Beach County and the Treasure Coast are living with HIV. More than 40 percent of those who find out they have the virus are diagnosed almost 10 years after they are infected - and within a year of being diagnosed with AIDS.

Another 18 percent are diagnosed within the first year of infection, possibly because they know they have taken risks.

Although homosexual men made strides in fighting the epidemic in its early years, men who have sex

The Palm Beach County HIV CARE Council, the local planning council for HIV services, has started their annual process of prioritizing and allocating Ryan White dollars. The Priorities & Allocations (P&A) Committee of the CARE Council follows a comprehensive process which is based on federal guidelines. The Committee members include HIV service providers as well as people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA).

Over the past few years members have struggled with the tough decisions that come along with allocating dollars to the much needed HIV services. One of the main challenges is adjusting our current system to reflect the changes implemented by the federal government. In 2006, the federal direction of the Ryan White program changed. The changes to the program included shifting from a comprehensive program to a program that provides life saving care





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for PLWHA. One of the primary goals is to ensure Ryan White programs work toward bringing <u>all</u> PLWHA who are aware of their status in to primary medical care. While Ryan White dollars may be used for supportive services, like food and financial assistance, the supportive services are to be used in order to enhance access to and retention in primary medical care. The most recent data provided from Florida Department of Health estimates that in Palm Beach County only 72% of PLWHA who are aware of their status are in primary medical care.

Another struggle for Palm Beach County's HIV service system is that the grant award for Ryan White has decreased 20%, approximately \$2 million dollars, since 2004.

In Memoriam of Lorenza Jackson

Lorenza Jackson, a dedicated member of the Palm Beach County HIV CARE Council, passed away on Friday, April 25, 2008 at the age of 49.

Lorenza was an advocate of HIV-related issues in Belle Glade and assisted with the 2007 Needs Assessment by working as a data collector in the Glades area. He was a member of the CARE Council for five years and held the position of CARE Council Vice Chair in 2005. He was also a member of the Executive Committee, Priorities & Allocations Committee, Planning Committee and Community Awareness Committee. Lorenza served as Planning Committee Chair for one and a half years following his three-year tenure as the committee's Vice Chair. He also served as Vice Chair of the Priorities & Allocations Committee.

Lorenza's CARE Council attendance record serves as the model of commitment: with the exception of one committee meeting in 2005, Lorenza had perfect attendance on the CARE Council and four committees for over three years.

Mary Jane Reynolds, Lorenza's close friend of 12 years, remembers Lorenza as an incredibly caring person: he was a compassionate man who treated everyone with compassion and respect and was a trusted confidante to many. He was the first to offer a helping hand to anyone in need and could always be seen opening a door or helping to carry boxes of snacks and supplies into meetings.

Born in Clewiston, Florida, Lorenza grew up with several brothers and a twin sister. He worked as a restaurant manager and minister and was a member of St. Paul's Church of God in Christ.



Lorenza's generous spirit, selfless manner and service to the community will be greatly missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing him.

Is Anyone Listening?

Is anyone listening? A few months ago, I was in a meeting that discussed how HIV/AIDS was impacting the African-American community. It was then that I thought there needs to be more dialogue in reference to sexual orientation and HIV/AIDS infection rates. I do realize most people feel if there are high numbers of MSM impacted with HIV/AIDS that would seem to be the norm, since many still feel that it is a gay (MSM) disease. It is true that the first wave of Americans infected with the virus were gay (MSM). but worldwide there are more heterosexuals impacted with HIV. My thought is that the US needs to have more communication about sexual orientation. The sexual orientation conversation has not happened much in minority communities. I think if we had more frank talk about sexual orientation there may be a decrease in the number of people becoming infected. If people really understood their risk factors, they may no be so inclined to put themselves at risk.

The conversations are coming, maybe not soon enough, but they will happen. 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with men are accounting for rising numbers of new infections.

Compass, the county's gay and lesbian community center, has long led a drive to spread prevention messages, but HIV prevention manager Chris Lacharite said the center can't succeed on its own.

Although churches have been slow to join the fight against the pandemic, Drayton is one of a growing number of pastors opening their churches' doors to people who want to know whether they are infected with the virus that has taken more than half a million American lives since the start of the epidemic.

On Friday, his parishioners will offer HIV tests in a fire station. That is a start, Drayton says. With 19 members of the church having completed state training to be certified HIV testers, they will offer testing wherever they see the need.

For Drayton, it is another step in a mounting battle that he challenged church leaders to join, first in a doctoral thesis and in his recently published book, *Transformation and the Church, A Push Toward Acceptance Within the HIV/AIDS Pandemic*.

His church's involvement was helped by a statewide drive to involve more religious leaders in the fight.

"It's a natural," Florida Surgeon General Ana Viamonte Ros said Wednesday. "We found through churches it's easy to get health care messages out."

It is a venue that has been effective in other healthscreening drives, she said. The growing faith-based involvement, as well as the reach into other community sites, shows promise even if it is too early to show results, said Doris Carroll, director of the Palm Beach County Substance Abuse Coalition. She worries, though, that federal money fueling this year's effort - and last year's, when 1,000 people were tested - will dry up.

"But now," she said, "the force is with us."
