Emergency officials will be communicating with residents using <u>Facebook</u> and <u>Twitter</u>. You can download the county's free emergency app, <u>PBC DART</u>, which will provided you with vital information such as your storm surge evacuation areas, flood zones, shelter locations, grocery and building supply stores with emergency generators, and gas stations that remain open. The app also lets individuals and businesses send damage reports, in real time, to the Emergency Operations Center, which will enable emergency workers to access and respond to areas needing attention during and after
