#### The Future of 911: Text and Video

The county's 911 system receives more than one million calls annually, and the majority of them are made from cell phones. Consequently, Palm Beach County (PBC) utilizes advanced technology that identifies the phonenumber and location of a



caller, even when the call is from a mobile phone and istransferred from one cell tower to another. In addition, PBC 911uses an advanced Geographical Information Systems (GIS) to accurately displaythe physical location of the caller providing quick and accurate information for emergency responders.

Moreover, the county is working on a number of initiatives to ensure our systems outpace technological advances incommunications. The county is currently working to enable Text-to-9-1-1, which promises to bring even more functionality and versatility to those inneed of emergency assistance. Also, in development is Video-to-9-1-1 which could be a significant tool for first responders prior to dispatching to the site of an incident.

### FAU 911 System Upgraded



I recently toured the new 911
command center at Florida Atlantic
University's Police Department
(FAUPD) in Boca Raton. FAUPD, in
conjunction with the Palm Beach
County Public Safety Department,
recently designated the campus
police department a Public Safety
Answering Point (PSAP) with the
county. Dispatchers will now be able
to precisely pinpoint the location of
on-campus 911 calls and monitor a live
feed from more than 1,000 cameras
throughout the 850-acre campus.

Prior to this new system, all 911 calls from the FAU campus would go to the Boca Raton Police Department, which would transfer the calls to the FAU Police Department. During this transfer, information such as caller ID or location was lost. The upgraded call center immediately gives dispatchers the exact location of the call and the phone number.



Staffedwith two dispatchers, the call center was built into a room with severalmonitors that receive live video from more than 1,000 oncampus cameras, whichwere upgraded this past year. The monitors constantly provide real-timeimages throughout the campus, including hotspots such as the library and parking garages.

Thecounty's Public Safety
Department worked with the FAUPD
to provide, install andactivate the
equipment, which was fundedthrough
a state grant and repurposed
equipment. This major
safetyenhancement for the 31,000
students and 6,000 plus faculty – not
to mention visitors and parents represents Palm Beach County's
ongoing commitment to improving
public safety countywide.

#### **BCC Briefs**

At the October 18, 2016, Board of CountyCommissioners meeting, the board took the following action:

Homelessness – received and filed a fully executed commercial contract with the Center for Family Services in the amount of \$950,000 for the purchase of a homeless shelter in West PalmBeach.

PalmTran – authorizedfiling a grant application to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) in the amount of \$820,000 to implement new fare collection technology for Palm Tran. This funding is in addition to an initial grant of \$500,000. The board also approved the filing of an FTA grant in the amount of \$2.5 million for the deployment of transit signal priority along the Okeechobee Boulevard and LakeWorth corridors. No county funds are required to execute either award.

FireRescue – approved andratified the collective bargaining agreement between Palm Beach County and the Professional Firefighters/Paramedics of PBC, Local 2928, IAFF, Inc. pertaining to district chiefs in the supervisory unit.

Drones – accepted on behalf of the PalmBeach County Sheriff's Office \$1 million from the Florida Department of LawEnforcement to fund an unmanned aircraft system pilot program. The money willbe used to pay for hardware, software and professional services. No local matchis required.

Roads – adopted resolutions abandoning two sections of unimproved right of way within the Palm Beach Farms Company Plat 3. One was requested by the Solid Waste Authority to block public access to a site often used for illegal dumping. The other was requested by DiVosta Homes, LP topursue redevelopment of the Gulfstream PUD located east of Polo Road and southof Lake Worth Road. The board also continued to the November 1 BCC meeting arevised alignment for a segment of Congress Avenue between Northlake Boulevardand Park Lane.

MSTU – adopted a resolution confirming aspecial assessment under the county's municipal services taxing unit programfor canal maintenance in the unincorporated Sandalfoot Cove community near BocaRaton. Each of the 72 benefiting owners will be charged \$110 per lot.
