Dear Senator Powell,

As the Chair of the Solid Waste Authority of Palm Beach County, I am respectfully requesting that the Palm Beach County Legislative Delegation consider the attached amendment to Chapter 2001-331 Laws of Florida, which is the Solid Waste Authority's Special Act. Our proposed amendment changes the maximum length of franchises from five to seven years. I am certifying that amendment of the Special Act cannot be accomplished at the local level because the Florida Legislature is the only body that can amend the Special Act. While the proposed amendment is minor, we believe that its impact may be significant for the taxpayers of Palm Beach County.

The Florida Legislature created the Authority almost forty-one years ago as an Independent Special District. Subsequently, in 1991, the Special Act was amended to make the Authority a Dependent Special District with the Board of County Commissioners sitting as the board members of the Authority. The Authority's mission is to manage the materials discarded by the residents and businesses of Palm Beach County in a manner consistent with its legislative mandate, applicable local, state and federal ordinances, regulations and laws. Since the time of its creation, the Authority has set the standard for waste management and recycling by constructing and operating two waste-to-energy plants. The most recent plant was opened in 2015 and was the single largest public waste management project being constructed in the world.

The Solid Waste Authority competitively procures its waste hauler franchises every five years pursuant to the Special Act. The last procurement was awarded in 2013 and thanks to a competitive market, we were able to save taxpayers almost 15% over the previous franchise agreements. The Authority has continued to analyze how to lower rates and has determined that extending the franchise agreements to seven years is more favorable to securing competitive bid prices. The ability to depreciate their equipment over seven years rather than five should allow the haulers to be more price competitive when the next franchise agreements are advertised. Haulers that have declined to bid on five-year franchises may be more encouraged to bid on seven-year agreements. The Authority has reached out to its existing haulers and has not received

any negative feedback; in fact all of them have been positive about the proposed change. Giving the Authority the opportunity to extend hauling franchises to seven years gives the Authority flexibility to serve the best interests of the taxpayers of Palm Beach County.

I am requesting that the enclosed legislation, prepared by the Authority, be placed on the agenda for consideration and approval by the Palm Beach Legislative Delegation for introduction and passage by the 2017 Florida Legislature.

SUMMARY OF SOLID WASTE AUTHORITY OF PALM BEACH COUNTY LEGISLATION

Background:

- SWA established in 1975 by Special Act of the Florida Legislature (Chapter 75-473)
- SWA is a Dependent Special District
- SWA provides solid waste collection services to the unincorporated area of the County,
- through a competitively bid franchise system
- SWA's mission: manage the materials discarded by the residents of Palm Beach County in a manner consistent with its legislative mandate, applicable local, state and federal ordinances, regulations and laws
- SWA has overseen the construction and operation of a six transfer stations, two waste-toenergy plants, a landfill, and the reclamation of several closed landfills in Paln Beach County.

Proposed amendment:

Subsection 10 of section (10 of section (3) of chapter 2001-331(1). Change "5" to "7"

Rationale:

- The current limitation of five years for collection franchises, with no option to renew is shorter than nine counties and 27 municipalities surveyed in the State. Typical terms are seven to 10 years.
- The change would allow private companies to depreciate their equipment over seven years, which is the industry standard, rather than five
- Seven year contracts would encourage haulers not currently operating in the County to compete for future franchise awards
- Lower fees for ratepayers should result as the level of competition increases and haulers can depreciate the cost of equipment over a longer period of time

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Subsection (1) of section 10 of section 3 of chapter 2001-331, Laws of Florida, is amended to read:

Section 10. Limitations on franchises.—The Authority shall adopt by resolution a procedure for granting exclusive franchises, subject to the following limitations:

(1) No franchise, contract, or permit shall be granted or extended for a period of time exceeding 7.5 years.

Section 2. This act shall take effect upon becoming a law.

II. Cost

The proposed language increasing the maximum contract term from five (5) years to seven (7) years will have no impact on the cost of implementation, administration or enforcement. The Authority expects that the proposed language will put downward pressure on the cost of solid waste and recycling collection service by encouraging lower bid prices and increased competition, however the magnitude of the impact is unknown. Extending the term of the franchise agreements will allow the haulers to depreciate their equipment over a longer period which should result in lower rates paid by the Authority's residential, commercial and governmental customers. Additionally, the longer contract may increase competition for the Authority's franchises. Based on evidence, particularly statements from qualified haulers that have not bid on Authority contracts, the primary reason given for not bidding was the Authority's short contract term. Given the sizeable costs of start-up, including the costs of acquiring facilities, personnel and equipment to service the contracts, the short contract term represents a significant barrier to entry that limits competition. In order to ensure competition for the Authority's five (5) franchise areas it is imperative that there be more bidders than service areas. Consolidation in the waste hauling industry has resulted in fewer qualified firms bidding on the Authority's contracts. It is expected that this change will reverse that trend.

III. Funding Sources

The cost of solid waste and recycling collection services provided pursuant to the collection franchises is funded through user fees. No additional funding sources are required.

IV. Economic Impact

- 1. Advantages to Individuals: Potentially decreased collection rates due to increased competition for SWA contracts and the ability of the franchise haulers to depreciate their equipment over seven (7) years rather than five (5) years.
- 2. Advantages to Businesses: Potentially decreased collection rates due to increased competition for SWA contracts and the ability of the franchise haulers to depreciate their equipment over seven (7) years rather than five (5) years.
- 3. Advantages to Government: Potentially decreased collection rates due to increased competition for SWA contracts and the ability of the franchise haulers to depreciate their equipment over seven (7) years rather than five (5) years.

VI. Specific Data Used in Reaching Estimates

In coming to this conclusion, the Authority relied upon statements from management of qualified waste haulers including companies the Authority contracts with and companies that have expressed an interest in bidding on the Authority franchise contracts, but declined. The overwhelming sentiment was

that the Authority's five (5) year contract term was a disincentive. In an effort to validate this anecdotal evidence, the Authority conducted a survey of other jurisdictions in the State, through which it was determined that the Authority's five-year contract term is the shortest in Florida and that the next shortest franchise in Florida is seven (7) years.

In the most recent bid process conducted in 2013, the Authority received bids from five (5) bidders for four (4) franchise service areas. Further consolidation in the waste hauling business could result in fewer bidders than service areas, which in turn could result in higher bid prices as those bidders will have a reasonable expectation that they will all receive a contract. It is the Authority's belief that the increase in the allowable contract term from five (5) to seven (7) years will bring the Authority's contracts in line with the industry norm. While the precise impact on future bid rates cannot be determined, this change is anticipated to put downward pressure on those rates.
