I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to adopt: An Ordinance of the Board of County Commissioners of Palm Beach County, Florida, pertaining to posting of human trafficking public awareness signs; providing for definitions; providing for general requirements; providing for enforcement; providing for severability; providing for repeal of laws in conflict; providing for inclusion in the Code of Laws and Ordinances; providing for captions; providing for applicability; and providing for an effective date.

Summary: The Board of County Commissioners, at its May 15, 2015 meeting, directed staff to prepare an ordinance pertaining to human trafficking upon passage of a state law pertaining to this subject. The new law (Ch. 2015-172), signed by the Governor on June 16, 2015, authorizes counties to enforce posting of human trafficking public awareness signs at adult entertainment and massage/bodywork establishments alerting employees and patrons to remedies and protections related to human trafficking. The law and provisions of this proposed ordinance are to become effective January 1, 2016. Countywide (JB)

Background and Policy Issues: A new Florida law (Ch. 2015-172), to become effective January 1, 2016, authorizes counties to enforce posting of human trafficking public awareness signs at adult entertainment and massage/bodywork establishments alerting employees and patrons to remedies and protections related to human trafficking. The new law requires the employer at each of the following establishments to display public awareness signs in a conspicuous location that is clearly visible to the public and employees of the establishment:

- (a) A strip club or other adult entertainment establishment.
- (b) A business or establishment that offers massage or bodywork services for compensation that is not owned by a health care profession regulated pursuant to Chapter 456 and defined in Section 456.001.

The law authorizes county commissions to adopt ordinances to enforce posting of human trafficking public awareness signs in the above referenced establishments and that violations related thereto are punishable only by fine. This Ordinance requires employers to display public awareness signs in conspicuous locations that are clearly visible to the public and employees at strip clubs, adult entertainment and massage/bodywork establishments. The signs provide contact information to report anyone who is being forced to engage in an activity against their will.

13	WHEREAS, human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery, which involves
14	the exploitation of persons for commercial sex or forced labor and often subjects
15	victims to force, fraud and coercion; and
16	WHEREAS, while many victims of human trafficking are forced to work in
17	prostitution or the sexual entertainment industry, trafficking also occurs in forms of
18	labor exploitation, such as domestic servitude and restaurant, janitorial, sweatshop
19	factory and agricultural work; and
20	WHEREAS, traffickers use various techniques to instill fear in victims to keep
21	them enslaved such as isolation, threats of imprisonment and deportation, confiscation
22	of passports, visas or other identification documents and threats of violence toward
23	victims or their families; and
24	WHEREAS, Florida law authorizes counties to enforce posting of human
25	trafficking public awareness signs in certain establishments; and,
26	WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners finds that it will serve the
27	public health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Palm Beach County to inform the
28	public as to the existence of human trafficking and the reporting thereof.
29	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY
30	COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:
31	Section 1. Definitions
32	The following words, phrases, or terms when used in this Ordinance shall
33	unless the content otherwise indicates, have the meanings provided below.
34	A. Adult Entertainment Establishment means adult bookstores and theaters

- B. Bodywork Services means services involving therapeutic touching or manipulation of the body using specialized techniques.
- C. Business or establishment means any place of business or any club, organization, person, firm, corporation or partnership, wherein massage or bodywork services are provided and such establishment is not owned by a health care profession regulated pursuant to Chapter 456, Florida Statutes, and defined in Section 456.001, Florida Statutes, as may be amended.
- D. Human trafficking means transporting, soliciting, recruiting, harboring, providing, enticing, maintaining, or obtaining another person for the purpose of exploitation of that person regulated pursuant to Chapter 787, Florida Statutes, and defined in Section 787.06, Florida Statutes, as may be amended.
- E. Massage services means the manipulation of the soft tissues of the human body with the hand, foot, arm, or elbow, whether or not such manipulation is aided by hydrotherapy, including colonic irrigation, or thermal therapy; any electrical or mechanical device; or the application to the human body of a chemical or herbal preparation.

Section 2. General Requirements

A. The employer at each of the following establishments shall display public awareness signs in a conspicuous location that is clearly visible to the public and employees of the establishment:

- (1) A strip club or other adult entertainment establishment.
- (2) A business or establishment that offers massage or bodywork services for compensation that is not owned by a health care profession regulated pursuant to Chapter 456, Florida Statutes, and defined in Section 456.001, Florida Statutes.
- B. The required public awareness sign must be at least 8.5 inches by 11 inches in size, must be printed in at least a 16-point type, and must state substantially the following in English, Creole and Spanish:

"If you or someone you know is being forced to engage in an activity and cannot leave—whether it is prostitution, housework, farm work, factory work, retail work, restaurant work, or any other activity—call the National Human Trafficking Resource Center at 1-888-373-7888 or text INFO or HELP to 233-733 to access help and

services. Victims of slavery and human trafficking are protected under United States and Florida law." Posted Pursuant to Section 787.29, Florida Statutes and Palm Beach County Code Section (Insert Section #)

Section 3. Enforcement

S

It is unlawful to violate any provisions of this Ordinance and any violation hereof shall be deemed a noncriminal violation, punishable by a fine only as provided in Section 775.083, Florida Statutes.

Section 4. Severability

If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance is for any reason held by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, inoperative, or void, such holding shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance.

Section 5. Repeal of Laws in Conflict

All local laws and ordinances in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 6. Inclusion in the Code of Laws and Ordinances

The provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Palm Beach County Code. The sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered to accomplish such, and the word "ordinance" may be changed to "section," "article," or other appropriate word.

Section 7. Captions

The captions, section headings, and section designations used in this Ordinance are for convenience only and shall have no effect on the interpretation of the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 8. Applicability

All provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to the unincorporated areas of Palm Beach County, Florida, and to all municipalities within Palm Beach County that elect to have the provisions of this Ordinance apply within their respective jurisdictions.

Section 9. Effective Date

The provisions of this Ordinance shall become effective on January 1, 2016.

Human Trafficking

Human trafficking is a crime against a person. It does not have to involve travel, transportation or border crossings. The federal Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 outlines trafficking under two main headings:

the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, obtaining, patronizing, or soliciting of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act, in which the commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion or in which the person induced to perform such act has not attained 18 years of age. (22 USC § 7102)

Labor Trafficking:

the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery. (22 USC § 7102)

Florida Statute § 787.06 defines human trafficking as the transporting, soliciting, recruiting, harboring, providing, enticing, maintaining, or obtaining another person for the purpose of exploitation of that person.

Statistics:

20.9 million people are estimated to be trafficked around the world at any given time.

Human trafficking is estimated to be a \$150 billion dollar annual business. Trafficking is the second largest source of illegal income internationally: Drug dealing is #1.

Florida is ranked 3rd in the nation for reported call volume to the National Human Trafficking Hotline.

Palm Beach County is ranked 3rd in the state for reported call volume to the National Human Trafficking Hotline.

- 73% of hotline calls in 2016 were sex trafficking, 14% were labor trafficking, 9% were not specified, 4% were sex and labor.
- 84% were female, 13% were male
- 65% were adults, 32% were minors
- Of those callers identifying citizenship, 59% were U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents.

What Palm Beach County is Doing:

Palm Beach County's Enhanced Collaborative Human Trafficking Task Force

In 2016, the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO), in partnership with Catholic Charities Diocese of Palm Beach (CCDPB), was awarded federal funding through the United States Department of Justice. Bureau of Justice Assistance and Office for Victims of Crime, to establish an enhanced collaborative strategy to combat human trafficking in Palm Beach County. Through this project, the Palm Beach County Human Trafficking Task Force has been established which includes local, state, and federal law enforcement, prosecution, victims' services, and other key community stakeholders working together to address human trafficking in our community. Task Force members work together to identify victims of all types of human trafficking through coordinated training, public awareness, and outreach efforts; to conduct proactive investigations of sex and labor trafficking; to make datadriven decisions based on the prevalence, scope and nature of human trafficking in PBC; and to provide a comprehensive array of services to meet the individualized needs of human trafficking victims.

The Human Trafficking Coalition of the Palm Beaches

The Human Trafficking Coalition of the Palm Beaches along with Palm Beach County Victim Services provides trainings to Palm Beach County employees, local schools, community agencies, and law enforcement to raise awareness of the crime of human trafficking.

Services for Victims of Human Trafficking

Direct service agencies who assist victims with needed support including crisis intervention, food, clothing, transportation, housing, employment, education, and legal assistance include Palm Beach County Division of Victim Services, Catholic Charities, Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County, and International Rescue Committee.

Warning Signs:

Work or Living Condition Indicators

- Is not free to leave or come and go as he/she wishes
- Is under 18 and is providing commercial sex acts
- Is in the commercial sex industry and has a pimp / manager
- Is unpaid, paid very little, or paid only through tips
- Works excessively long and/or unusual hours
- Is not allowed breaks or suffers under unusual restrictions at work

- · Was recruited through false promises concerning the nature and conditions of his/her work
- High security measures exist in the work and/or living locations (e.g. opaque windows, boarded up windows, bars on windows, barbed wire, security cameras, etc.)
- Living at place of employment
- · Lives with multiple people in cramped space

Behavioral Signs

People who are trafficked may:

- Show fear or anxiety
- Seem depressed, intimidated, submissive, tense, nervous, or paranoid
- · Become unusually fearful or anxious after bringing up law enforcement or are distrustful of authorities
- · Avoid eye contact or lack emotional responsiveness
- Act as if someone else instructed them, give responses that seem scripted or rehearsed
- Allow others to speak for them or are accompanied by a group or a controlling friend or boyfriend who speaks for them
- Resist assistance

Physical Signs

People who are trafficked may:

- Appear malnourished
- * Shows signs of physical abuse such as bruises, scratches, scars, missing teeth, lacerations, burns, carvings
- · Lack health care and have rotten teeth
- · Be dressed inappropriately for the weather or venue
- Have tattoos or other forms of branding usually on the neck or lower back. Tattoos may say "Daddy" or "Property of" or "For Sale"

Questions to Ask:

- Can you leave your job if you want to?
- Can you come and go as you please?
- Have you been hurt or threatened if you try to leave?
- Has your family been threatened?
- Do you live with your employer?
- Are you in debt to your employer?
- · Where do you eat and sleep?
- Do your family/friends know where you are?
- Do you have access to your personal identity information (ID, SS card, passport)? Who keeps it for you?

I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to receive and file: an update on Human Trafficking Training.

Summary: On August 16, 2016, the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) directed staff to develop an expansion of training to County staff and community partners in an effort to combat human trafficking. On April 4, 2017, the County's Public Safety Department, Division of Victim Services (PBCVS) presented a proposal to the BCC on human trafficking training for County staff and community partners utilizing existing County staff and resources. Since then, PBCVS has accomplished the following milestones utilizing existing resources: 1) training materials have been developed in collaboration with the Human Trafficking Coalition of the Palm Beaches in various formats, customized to the target audience; 2) in-person training was developed and has been provided to over 500 front-line County employees by PBCVS staff and members of the Human Trafficking Coalition of the Palm Beaches; 3) a Human Trafficking website to educate the citizens of Palm Beach County, was developed and announced via a press release on April 11, 2018; 4) a training video, was produced and will be viewed by all new county employees within 2 months of hire and all existing county employees within 6 months of rollout; 5) the National Association of Counties presented Palm Beach County with a 2018 Achievement Award for the Human Trafficking Awareness Program. Additionally, the PBCVS will collaborate with the League of Cities to encourage training with municipalities located within Palm Beach County. Through these efforts, Palm Beach County will continue to work towards the prevention and elimination of trafficking of persons. Countywide (SF)

Background and Policy Issues: Human trafficking is the fastest growing criminal industry in the world, recently rising to the second most common criminal activity behind the illegal drug trade. Human Trafficking occurs when a trafficker uses force, fraud or coercion to control another person for the purpose of engaging in commercial sex acts or soliciting labor or services against his/her will. Florida has been identified as a hub for human trafficking activity, citing one of the highest incidences of human trafficking in the country and recently listed as the 3rd highest state in the US for human trafficking activity.

Background and Justification continued from Page 1:

Two years ago, several different agencies in the community were working on strategies to combat Human Trafficking, however, none of those strategies involved awareness training specific for County employees. The County enacted Ordinance PBC 2015-029, which pertains to the posting and enforcement of Human Trafficking public awareness signs. The Division of Victim Services provides advocacy and therapy for victims of Human Trafficking, performs community training and participates in outreach events with the Human Trafficking Coalition of Palm Beach County and other key stakeholders. The Human Trafficking Coalition meets monthly and provides HT 101, an in-depth training for those requesting it. They have a "Walk the Streets" initiative that engages local businesses. The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office recently received a Human Trafficking grant to form a multidisciplinary task force, collect data, hire additional detectives and increase community awareness and services to victims. The Division of Victim Services will continue to serve on PBSO's task force and the Human Trafficking Coalition to provide education and information to the community on ways to identify and prevent Human trafficking.




