# HISTORY AND MISSION OF THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION

The mission of the Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) is to study all aspects of the criminal justice and crime prevention systems within federal, state, county, municipal, and private agencies in Palm Beach County. This includes examining related health, human services, and educational systems to identify their impact on criminal justice and crime prevention.

## Mission Statement

The CJC serves as an advisory commission to the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners. It is comprised of 35 members:

- ▶ 18 public sector members representing local, state, and federal criminal justice and governmental agencies.
- ▶ 17 private sector members, including:
  - 10 business leaders nominated by the Economic Council of Palm Beach County (including one representative each from CareerSource and the Health Care District).
  - Two Chamber of Commerce Representatives (one representative each from the Black Chamber of Commerce and the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce).
  - Five at-large members:
    - One clergy member nominated by diverse faith associations in the county.
    - One returning citizen.
    - One crime survivor.
    - One student (aged 17–22).
    - One at-large community member.
  - Nominated by the CJC and ratified by the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners

## Objectives

The CJC's primary goal is to develop and recommend policies and programs to the Board of County Commissioners that:

- ▶ Ensure the coordination of law enforcement and crime prevention efforts in Palm Beach County.
- ▶ Ensure an efficient, just, and cost effective criminal justice system in Palm Beach County.
- ▶ Effect a long-term reduction in crime in Palm Beach County.

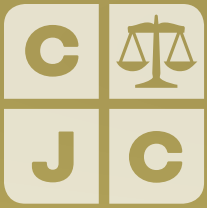

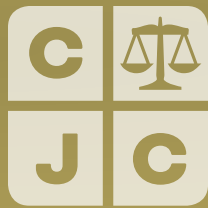

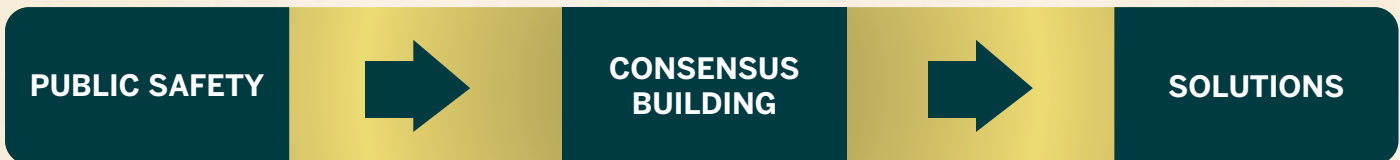


Figure 10 CJC and School Board Member Marcia Andrews accepts congratulations

### Behavioral Health Task Force

**Chair:** Captain Randy Foley

**Co-Chair:** Lisa Williams-Taylor

**Purpose:** The Behavioral Health Taskforce address gaps in Palm Beach County's behavioral health system, focusing on prevention, intervention, and reaction, with a strong emphasis on community safety and support within the criminal justice systems. This task force evolved from the Law Enforcement Planning Council sub-committee, School & Community Safety Initiative Committee.

#### Accomplishments as School & Community Safety Initiative Committee:

- **Palm Beach County Aware and Care Website:** Developed and branded a website to connect the community with behavioral health services, prevent mass violence, and raise awareness about warning signs and reporting. Continue to support this ongoing initiative at [www.pbc.gov/criminaljustice](http://www.pbc.gov/criminaljustice).
- **Awareness Campaign:** Launched campaigns, including billboards, bus wraps, and shelters, to promote the Aware and Care initiative at [www.pbc.gov/criminaljustice](http://www.pbc.gov/criminaljustice). **Working Groups:** Established three working groups to address gaps in prevention, intervention, and reaction within the mental health system.
- **Sequential Intercept Mapping (SIM):** Developing a visual map to identify service gaps and plan for systemic improvements for individuals with behavioral health needs in Palm Beach County.
- **School and Community Safety Initiative Recommendations:** Development of recommendations for presentation to the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners.

### Looking Ahead...

The Behavioral Health Task Force will develop a strategic plan to align its priorities in a logical, realistic, format. Its focus will continue to lend support, and recommend interventions for the gaps in services in this community.

### Community Engagement Task Force

**Chair:** Barbara Cheives

**Co-Chair:** (Retired) Chief Javaro Sims

**Purpose:** Community Engagement Task Force was established to enhance transparency, accountability, and trust between the criminal justice system and the community of Palm Beach County.

**Objectives:**

- **Information Dissemination:** Provide the public with comprehensive information about the criminal justice system and public safety issues.
- **Public Engagement:** Foster open dialogues to understand community concerns and needs, ensuring the criminal justice system serves the public effectively.
- **Support for Law Enforcement:** Assist law enforcement agencies by educating the public on matters affecting public safety, thereby building trust and legitimacy.

Community Engagement is one of the pillars of the MacArthur Foundation Safety and Justice Challenge Grant. Community Engagement involves people with lived experience and everyday citizens to help drive incremental change in criminal justice, such as through the Dialogue to Change process, which has once again been established. Dialogue to Change is a systemic methodology that engages residents, law enforcement, and other criminal justice partners to build trust and transparency to align the goals of the Criminal Justice Commission and the community. This work within the community will engage interested members and provide training to make a lasting change that will influence criminal justice policies.

Forging a partnership with Community Partners of South Florida, a pivotal change has become commonplace, utilizing community members to dialogue with members of the criminal justice community to gain insight and perspective. By fostering an opportunity to connect and see each other as valued and important members of Palm Beach County, slowly advancements are being made. CJC members had their first formal educational and training process that included on boarding. This provided them with a firm background on the history of the CJC to encourage maximum involvement. Soon community members and criminal justice professionals will continue the Dialogue to Change in 2025, including a Justice Leadership Academy used to promote civic engagement and education.

### Looking Ahead...

Expansion of Community Engagement, to include local community meetings to center on issues of importance in those communities. Expansion of the Justice Leadership Academy to include more groups with common knowledge or interests. Justice Leadership Academy graduates will be provided placement on CJC boards and task forces.

## CJC TASK FORCES, BOARDS, AND COUNCILS

### Court System Task Force

**Chair:** Judge April Bristow

The **Court System Task Force** is a specialized entity within the Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission (CJC), composed of representatives from various sectors of the criminal justice system, including judges, assistant state attorneys, assistant public defenders, and clerk of courts. The Court System Task Force plays a crucial role in maintaining the integrity and effectiveness of the court system in Palm Beach County, ensuring that it operates efficiently and serves the community effectively.

**Purpose:** To advise and make policy recommendations concerning the courts in Palm Beach County in a proactive manner or as directed by the Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission.

#### Objectives:

- **Advising on Court Policies:** Providing policy recommendations concerning the courts in Palm Beach County proactively or as directed by the CJC.
- **Evaluating Programs:** Researching, monitoring, and evaluating existing and proposed court system programs to promote an efficient, and cost-effective, court system and criminal justice system overall.
- **Support for Law Enforcement:** Assist law enforcement agencies by educating the public on matters affecting public safety, thereby building trust and legitimacy.
- **Communicating Findings:** Sharing the Task Force's findings with the CJC and members of the criminal justice system to inform decision-making and policy development.

#### Some of the projects of the Court Systems Task Force:

- Evaluation of Pre-Trial Practices in Palm Beach County including an analysis of the effectiveness of existing release mechanisms and a comparison of regular and duty judges is to be prepared by CJC Research and Planning Staff.
- First Appearance Frequent Utilizer "Next Steps" Pilot Project (SJC) will be evaluated in 2025 by Florida State University.
- NIJ – A Mixed-Method Examination of the Effectiveness of Money Bail and other Pretrial Release Options (SJC) will be evaluated by Florida State University in 2026.
- FSU Partnership to research the efficacy of money bail relative to alternative mechanisms of pretrial release through an Experimental design, which includes quasi-experimental and qualitative analysis components. This study draws on data from a randomized controlled trial, which will be conducted at the stage of the defendants' initial court appearance as well as historical data of all booking in the PBC jail over a 5- year period. An evaluation of this program is underway and slated to be available in 2025.





## Law Enforcement Planning Council

**Chair:** TBD

**Co-Chair:** TBD

**Purpose:** The LEPC ensures efficient coordination of law enforcement services across the towns, villages, cities, and jurisdictional entities of Palm Beach County through cooperative participation across all law enforcement agencies.

### Accomplishments:

- **School and Community Safety Committee Recommendations:** Developed actionable insights to improve school and community safety.
- **Legislative Advocacy:** Working in collaboration with stakeholder partners on legislative items that align with public safety goals.
- **Domestic Violence Coordinated Community Response Team:** Collaborating with the Palm Beach County Public Safety Department to pilot a community response approach to reduce domestic and intimate partner violence, to include a law enforcement training component.
- **Evaluation of Delray Beach Community Outreach Team:** Assessing the impact of law enforcement alternatives to arrest for individuals facing homelessness and behavioral health challenges. Evaluation to be conducted by Florida Atlantic University.
- **Trauma-Informed Train-the-Trainer Training:** Delivered specialized training to equip community leaders with the tools to address trauma effectively.
- **Trauma-Informed Training Evaluation:** Monitoring the countywide impact of the Trauma-Informed Train-the-Trainer initiative to increase awareness and reduce trauma incidents across the criminal justice system. The Florida Atlantic University (FAU) evaluation team conducted follow-up surveys with 54 trauma-informed trainers who attended the training in September 2022, achieving a 48% response rate with 26 trainers completing the survey. This feedback informed the development of two interview guides: one for trainers who have provided trauma-informed training and another for those interested in offering it in the future. Six trainers have completed thirteen trauma-informed trainings. FAU developed a protocol for an implementation guide that will be completed in 2025.

## Looking Ahead...

LEPC will continue to build as a member driven organization within the CJC. As it strengthens its ranks, it will determine its own specific goals and objectives to enhance the efforts of law enforcement.

## Probation Advisory Board (PAB)

**Chair:** Judge Ashley Zuckerman

**Co-Chair:** TBD

**Purpose:** : The PAB has been established to oversee that there is proper implementation and management of misdemeanor probation services in Palm Beach County. The Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners contracts with a private vendor, currently Professional Probation Services, Inc., to provide these services. The PAB ensures that the contracted provider adheres to the terms of their agreement and delivers quality services to misdemeanor offenders.

### Objectives:

- **Contract Monitoring:** Conduct annual programmatic reviews of misdemeanor probation operations, focusing on the accuracy, timeliness, quality, and compliance of services provided.
- **Data Analysis:** Examine socio-demographic characteristics of misdemeanor probation clients and perform random case file audits across all service provider offices to ensure standards are met.
- **Reporting:** Present review findings to the Criminal Justice Commission and the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners, facilitating informed decision-making and continuous improvement.

## Looking Ahead...

Contract monitoring and evaluation – members review the contract to ensure contract compliance and case efficacy. Evaluation underway in 2025.





## Public Safety Coordinating Council (PSCC)

**Chair:** County Commissioner Michael Barnett

**Vice-Chair:** Nellie King

**Purpose:** The PSCC formulates recommendations for the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners regarding the implementation of the Criminal Justice, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse Reinvestment Grant Program. It also assesses mental health program availability, evaluates the population status of correctional detention facilities, and ensures jail capacity concerns are identified and addressed.

### Objectives:

- Provide recommendations on mental health program availability.
- Monitor the population status of all correctional detention facilities in Palm Beach County.
- Assessment of the availability of pretrial intervention or probation programs, work-release programs, substance abuse programs, gain-time schedules, applicable bail bond schedules, and the confinement status of the inmates housed within each facility owned or contracted by the county.

### Looking Ahead...

Public Safety Coordinating Council will provide recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners on mental health and substance abuse. As grant funding becomes available it will make application on behalf of Palm Beach County.

- **Jail Population Management Review Team:** Developing a work plan for the Jail Population Management Review Team to begin its work in 2025 as a Safety and Justice Challenge initiative born out of the Jail Stress Test conducted on September 27, 2023.
- **Bond Schedule Evaluation:** Monitoring Florida State University's evaluation of the new bond schedule and the impact on the jail population.



## Racial Equity Task Force

**Chair:** Rev. Kevin Jones

**Co-Chair:** Angie Pagan

**Purpose:** The Racial Equity Task Force was established to address and mitigate racial and ethnic disparities within the Palm Beach County criminal justice system. The Racial Equity Task Force plays a pivotal role in fostering a collaborative relationship between the criminal justice system and the residents of Palm Beach County, ensuring that public safety efforts are community-focused and effective.

### Objectives:

- **Identification:** Analyze data to uncover any racial and/or ethnic disparities in arrests, sentencing, and/or incarceration rates.
- **Strategy Development:** Formulate actionable recommendations to promote equity and fairness within the criminal justice system.
- **Community Engagement:** Collaborate with community members and stakeholders to ensure diverse perspectives inform policy decisions.

### Key Activities:

- **Data Analysis:** Conduct comprehensive reviews of criminal justice data to identify patterns of disparity.
- **Policy Recommendations:** Propose reforms aimed at reducing systemic biases and promoting equitable treatment for all individuals.
- **Public Forums:** Host events to engage the community in discussions about racial equity and gather input on proposed initiatives.

### Recent Initiatives:

- **Community Forums:** Organized events to discuss topics such as policing practices, aiming to bridge gaps between law enforcement and residents.
- **Educational Initiatives:** Developed programs to educate the community about the criminal justice system's functions and processes.
- **Feedback Mechanisms:** Established channels for community members to provide input on criminal justice policies and practices.

## Looking Ahead...

The Taskforce will provide educational lunch and learn sessions with criminal justice partners on the jail population and strategies used to reduce disparity. Work will continue to highlight our criminal justice system.



# CITIZEN'S CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACADEMY

## HIGHLIGHTS, ACTIVITIES, AND INITIATIVES

### Citizen's Criminal Justice Academy (CCJA)

The Criminal Justice Commission established the Citizen's Criminal Justice Academy (CCJA) in 1998 to educate the people in Palm Beach County about criminal justice. Subject matter experts are recruited to provide invaluable information about criminal justice from the local, county, and federal levels. A wide-ranging group of criminal justice professionals makes presentations. Classes are held in the evening for 6-12 weeks. Tours are held at the courthouse, jail, and the medical examiner's office. Often new locations are added for tours. The Academy is held three (3) times a year, including in Belle Glade. Ages 14 years and older are welcome to apply, and it is free. A certificate of participation is provided at the end of the CCJA.

# AMENDMENT TO THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION ORDINANCE: CJC BOARD EXPANSION

## 2024 Membership Breakdown

In 2023, the **Board of County Commissioners** revised the structure of the Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) to better reflect the diverse population of Palm Beach County through Ordinance No. 2023-039. This revision increased membership from **32 to 35** members, ensuring a balance between public and private sector representatives. This expanded structure aims to enhance the CJC's ability to address the needs of Palm Beach County effectively, promoting inclusivity and representation in decision-making processes.

# COURT TEXT REMINDER SYSTEM

*Funded by the MacArthur Foundation Safety and Justice Challenge (SJC)*

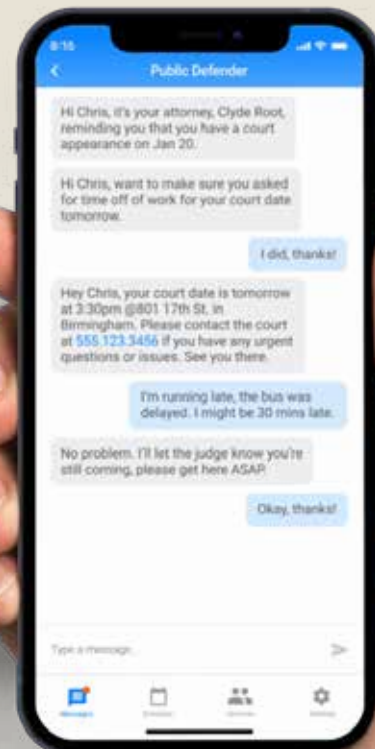
Since its implementation in **November 2018**, the **Court Text Reminder System** has played a vital role in reducing Failures to Appear (FTA) by sending defendants reminders of court dates and mandatory appointments.

## Enhancements:

- The **Pre-Trial Services Department** enhanced its client communication with the **Uptrust text message system** to ensure compliance with mandatory appointments. Clients are sent text reminders at seven days and one day ahead of appointments.
- Collection of race, ethnicity and gender data began in 2023 for examination of any potential disparities across race, ethnicity, and/or gender.

## Next Steps:

- Contracted with Florida State University (FSU) for system evaluation to determine program impact.
  - The Failure to Appear rate within Palm Beach County started at 8% (92% compliance). The determination will be made through system evaluation if the text reminder system has had a significant impact on Failure to Appear rates in Palm Beach County, which are historically low.







# SAFETY + JUSTICE CHALLENGE

Funded by the MacArthur Foundation Safety and Justice Challenge (SJC)

## Felony Mobile Probation Unit (MPU)



In January 2023, the Felony Mobile Probation Unit (MPU) was launched as an innovative, first-of-its-kind initiative in collaboration with the Florida Department of Corrections. The MPU aims to address the root causes of probation violations in Palm Beach County, including transportation barriers and employment challenges. This program is a proactive public safety measure that supports reentry efforts, reduces recidivism, and alleviates jail overcrowding. Additionally, the MPU helps probationers secure employment and resolve probation violations efficiently in one visit.

This public safety measure has met with initial success including the creation of new alliances, expanded hours of operation, locations for the MPU, and opportunities to provide service to the intended populations.

### Enhancements:

- Additional locations added for the MPU in 2024:
  - Greater Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church, Delray Beach,
  - The Re-Entry Center, Riviera Beach,
  - Children's Outreach, Riviera Beach, and
  - Numerous Palm Beach County Library sites.
- The Libraries have added a unique partnership that provides added opportunity for probationers to become library cardholders and users of library services as well. Palm Beach County Library - Palm Beach Gardens Branch and the MPU offer longer service hours to match some library hours.

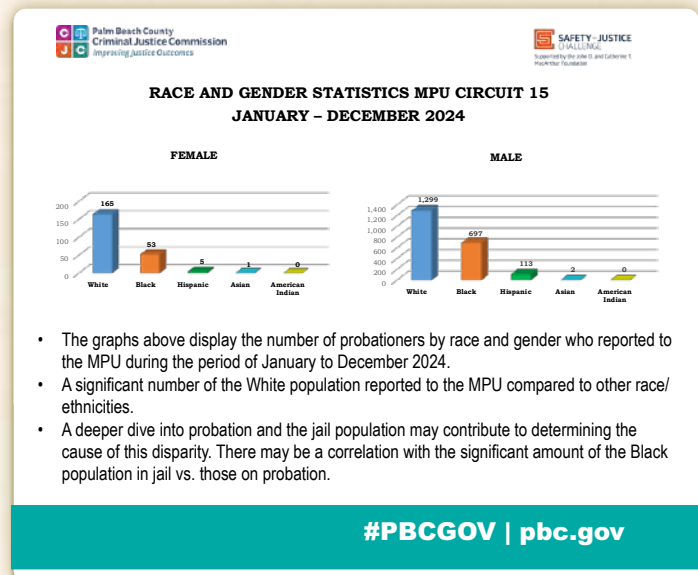
### Impact:

- In 2023, the MPU provided service to **2,136** clients.
- In 2024, the MPU was able to increase the number of clients receiving services to **2,335** clients.

**Recognition:** Palm Beach County received the prestigious **2023 National Association of Counties Award (NACo)** for the MPU during the NACo conference in Travis County, Texas, on July 23, 2023.

In 2024, the Mobile Probation Unit was selected by the Urban Institute to be part of a SJC Case Study. The goal of the case study will be to document and amplify the work of sites, which includes the successes, challenges, and impact.

**Next Steps:** An evaluation of the MPU program to include exploration of the root causes of violations and potential firsthand accounts by those with lived experience will take place in 2025. This study will be an in-house project provided by CJC Research and Planning Unit.







## Jail "Stress Test" Assessment

The Palm Beach County Jail "Stress Test" Assessment was conducted on **Wednesday, September 27, 2023**, and facilitated by **Dr. James Austin** of the JFA Institute. This innovative assessment aimed to evaluate the local jail population and assist the County in addressing case processing delays while developing a more efficient pretrial sentencing model. The ultimate goal is to safely reduce the in-custody waiting period, ensuring a fair and timely judicial process. This ongoing discussion of the process was instrumental in creating the Jail Population Management Review Team in 2024. Full implementation of the Team will begin in 2025 as a subcommittee of the Public Safety Coordinating Council.

**Participants:** Engaged **15 Stakeholders**

**Purpose:** To gather actionable insights for improving case processing efficiency through the evaluation of 42 case studies, each analyzed to identify system inefficiencies and potential areas for improvement.

### Recommendations:

1. Review in-custody arrests based on felony technical violations.
2. Analyze court events and establish scheduling guidelines using the National Center for Courts' recommendations.
3. Propose a Jail Population Management Review Team to evaluate cases exceeding one year of in-custody length.
4. Evaluate initial case conference recommendations with a focus on resource utilization.
5. Assess 3rd degree non-violent cases by examining bail amounts and length of stay.
6. Track cases down-filed from felony to misdemeanor or dismissed after 30 days.
7. Advocate for early intervention policies.

## Public Defender Program

The Public Defender Program expanded its social services initiatives through a contract with the Criminal Justice Commission, focusing on connecting pretrial new and existing clients to community-based resources. Started in 2017, this program was established to intersect individuals with key components necessary to create and maintain a stable life such as, housing, treatment, counseling, and workforce development opportunities.

- This program identifies clients at intake, with the goal of linking them to services to address immediate needs. Since before the pandemic, and during the very difficult time during the pandemic, the Public Defender Program has housed pretrial clients and linked them to social services within the community.

### Enhancements:

- A new position within the Public Defender's office, Social Services Coordinator, was added in September 2022, further enhancing client support efforts. This position works directly with clients to link them with community-based social services.
- In May 2024, the criteria for program eligibility was expanded based on an interlocal agreement with the Public Defender's Office to allow for a greater pool of potential program participants.

### Preliminary Findings:

#### According to Florida State University College of Criminology and Criminal Justice:

- There were 294 participants in the program of which approximately 45% of participants were non-Hispanic white, 46% were non-Hispanic Black, and 9% were Hispanic or Latino. The majority were male and averaged 41 years old at the time of booking.
- Participants of this program spent an average of 10 fewer days in jail during the period preceding the adjudication of their case as compared to a group of similarly situated non-participants that was reviewed in this study.
- Program participants have been somewhat less likely than non-participants to be charged with a new violent crime. This means that, arrests on new violent charges were exceedingly rare across both groups. However, the probability of new violent criminal activity was slightly lower among participants (1.2%) relative to non-participants (2.8%).
- Those charged with a crime after participation were for low-level non-violent charges.
- There have been no notable adverse effects on public safety nor court process efficiency.
- No added benefit to pretrial compliance has been identified for those participating in the Public Defender Program vs those who have not participated in the program.

## Next Steps Pilot Program

Launched in **October 2022**, the **Next Steps pilot program** focused on high frequency users of the criminal justice system with behavioral health challenges who cycle through the Palm Beach County Jail for low-level offenses. The program was developed based on findings from the Florida Atlantic University PalmFUSE study, which highlighted gaps in engaging potential participants and providing adequate resources. Next Steps set out to increase access to resources for participants identified during First Appearance hearings to break the cycle of repeated low-level incarcerations. The evaluation of the program is ongoing. It has been difficult to draw meaningful conclusions from a small number of program participants.

### Impact:

- The valiant efforts of this pilot program reached **44 participants** over a period of two years.
- Recidivism - 67% of program participants recidivated in the period following their participation in the program. It must be noted that despite the high rates of recidivism, most arrests were for non-violent charges.
- In **December 2024**, the contract ended for the ambitious pilot program that targeted a challenging and difficult to reach population.

**Next Steps:** Contracted with Florida State University who will be finalizing a program evaluation in 2025, detailing overall program impact based on their findings.





## Sequential Intercept Mapping (SIM) Cross-Systems Collaboration 2.0

In **September 2023**, the Criminal Justice Commission collaborated with Policy Research Associates to facilitate **Sequential Intercept Mapping (SIM)** training with **67 attendees** to identify and address service gaps in the Palm Beach County criminal justice system. The attendees included members of the Public Defender's Office, State Attorney's Office, Law Enforcement, professionals in behavioral health, community representatives, and professionals in reentry and public safety.

### Recommendations:

1. Increase structured and affordable housing solutions. Maximize and leverage housing options across a continuum of resources, including options for individuals with a history of criminal legal system involvement.
2. Expand access to Behavioral Health services.
3. Expand jail services inside of jail using peer mentors hired by community providers and peers.
4. Strengthen client care coordination from arrest to reentry.
5. Engage families and communities in criminal justice system processes.
6. Explore housing options for individuals with sex offense convictions.
7. Determine and identify where the continued SIM "work" will live and how existing cross-system workgroups will collaborate.

### Accomplishments:

- In January 2024, a representative from the Criminal Justice Commission staff was assigned to the Housing Development & Unsheltered Residents Cross-Departmental Team for Palm Beach County's Countywide Strategic Priorities.







## Youth Critical Intervention Mapping (CIM)

The **Critical Intervention Mapping (CIM)** training, conducted in **March 2024**, was a collaborative effort between the Palm Beach County School District, the Education Foundation, and the Criminal Justice Commission. Over 70 persons participated.

### Outcome:

Palm Beach County was selected as a site for the **SAMHSA GAIN Center's Learning Collaborative on Transition-Aged Youth Diversion and Supports**, focusing on:

- Development of strategic action plans for youth diversion.
- Providing technical assistance and expert access to program experts from around the country to provide support to Palm Beach County.
- Facilitating cross-team learning.

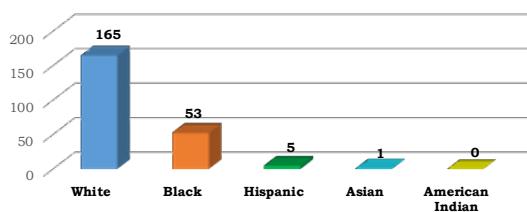




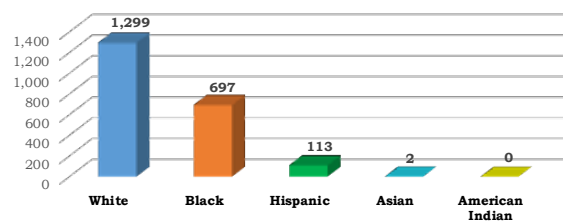
## Race and Gender Statistics Mobile Probation Unit (MPU) Circuit 15 January - December 2024

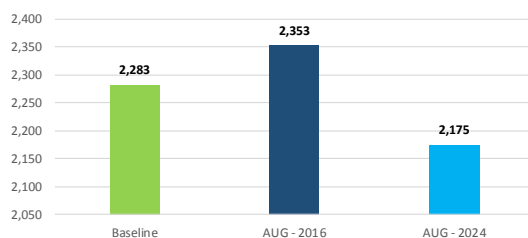

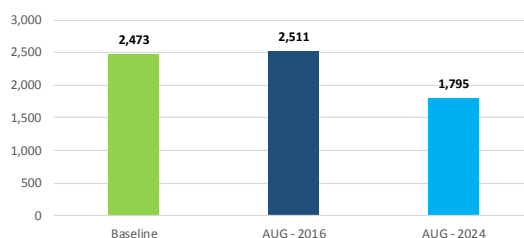
## Safely Reducing the PBC Jail Population

August 2016 - August 2024**



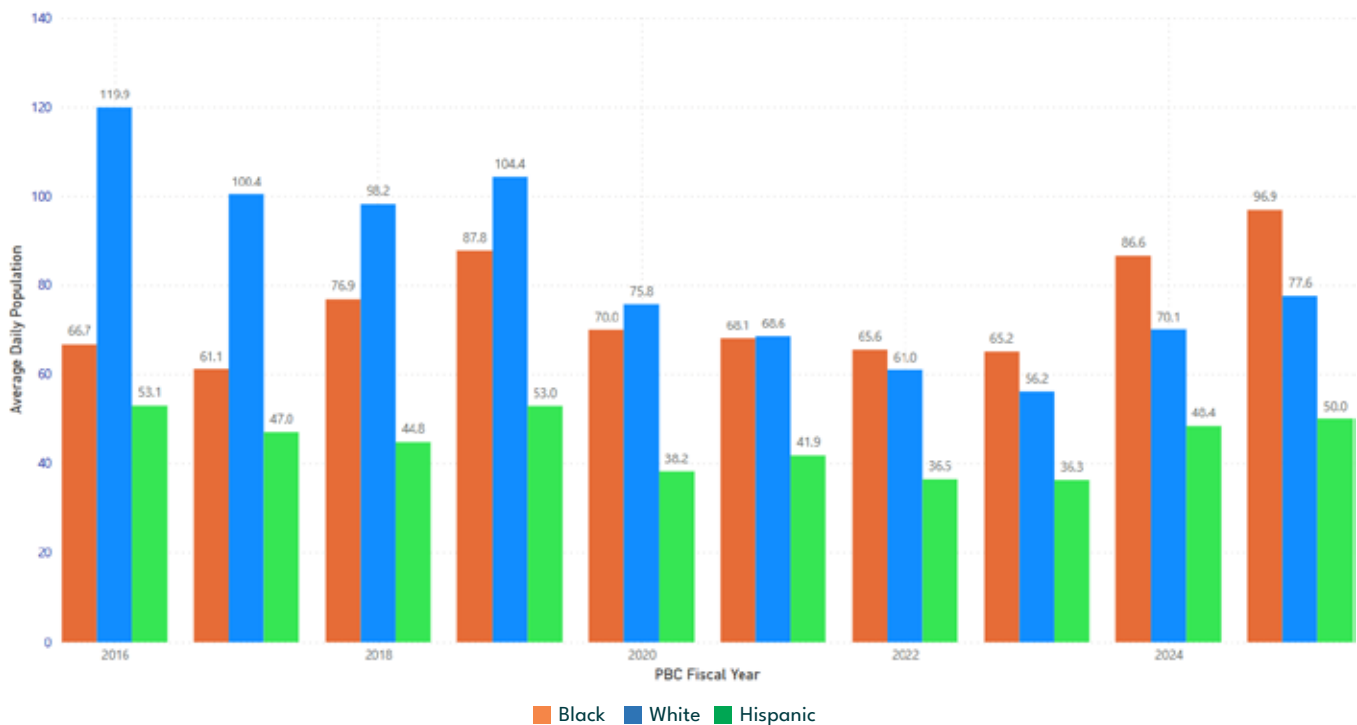
**Monthly Admissions Comparison

## **Collaboration to a Behavioral Health Crisis Now model in Palm Beach County (BHTF):**

Health Care District (HCD) of PBC is currently pursuing a study to implement a Behavioral Health “Crisis Now” model in PBC. This approach would offer inpatient 24/7 facility care for patients experiencing a psychological or behavioral health crisis. The goal of these settings is to provide care around the clock, stabilize the patient and get them back into the community as quickly as possible. CJC could support impact evaluation component on criminal justice system.

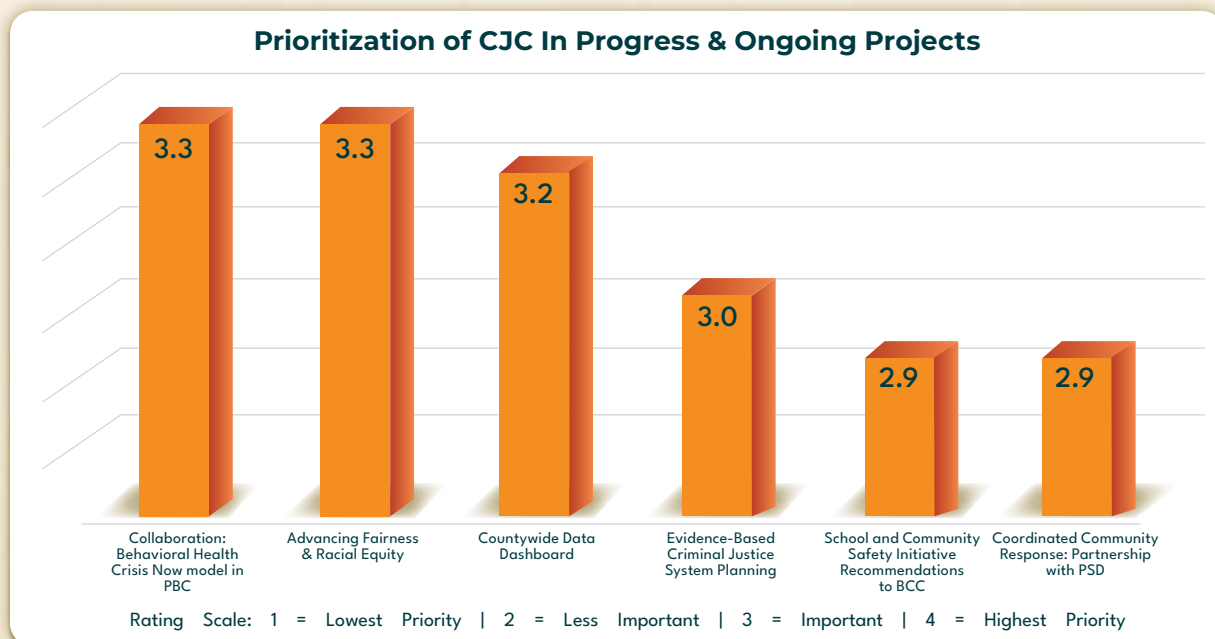
**Advancing Fairness & Racial Equity (RETF):** Assist in building an infrastructure to support and sustain the racial and ethnic disparity (RED) work and make recommendations for change through: 1. collect and analyze quantitative and qualitative data across the criminal justice system using a decision point analysis, 2. develop goals for reducing disparities and to regularly monitor and evaluate these goals, 3. use communications strategies to share RED plans with the community, 4. review of internal policies and practices of various criminal justice agency operations to identify racial disparities.

**Countywide Data Dashboard (Staff):** Establish a countywide integrated criminal justice data dashboard system that includes intersecting systems information to better inform and improve criminal justice system.

**Evidence-Based Criminal Justice System Planning (Staff):** Partnership with FSU and FDLE to conduct the first in the State pilot to develop a countywide criminal justice analyses system to help local decision-makers accurately plan for current and future criminal justice system needs.

**School and Community Safety Initiative Recommendations to the BCC (BHTF):** Recommendations have been developed, but the task force must work on what the BCC request will be. Coordinated Community Response (LEPC): Partnership with Public Safety Department to pilot a coordinated community response approach to addressing domestic and intimate partner violence and law enforcement training.

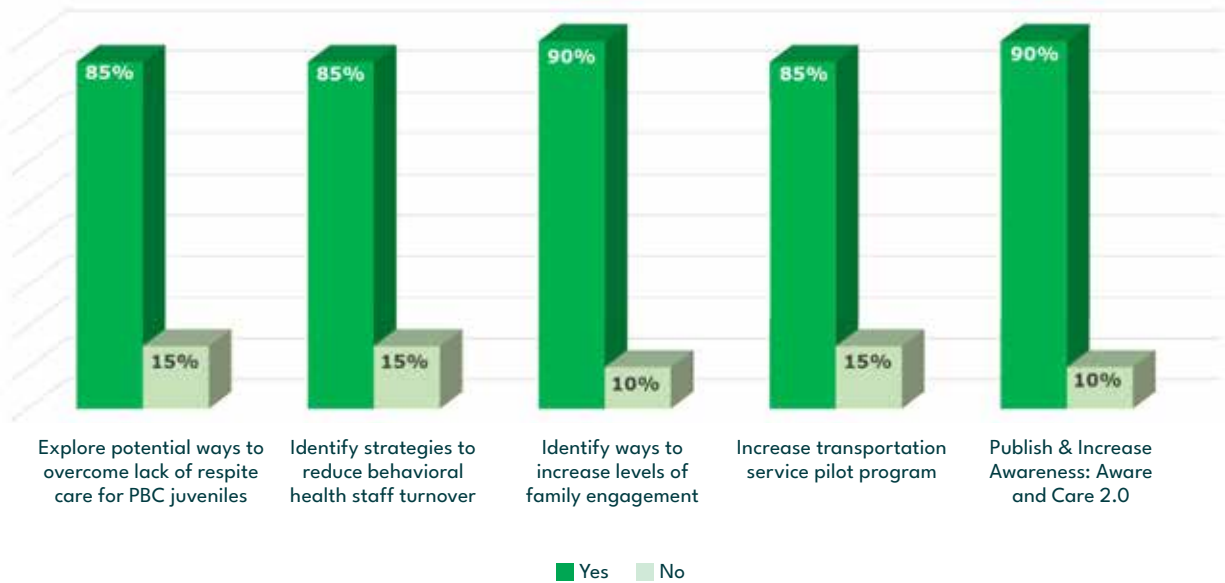
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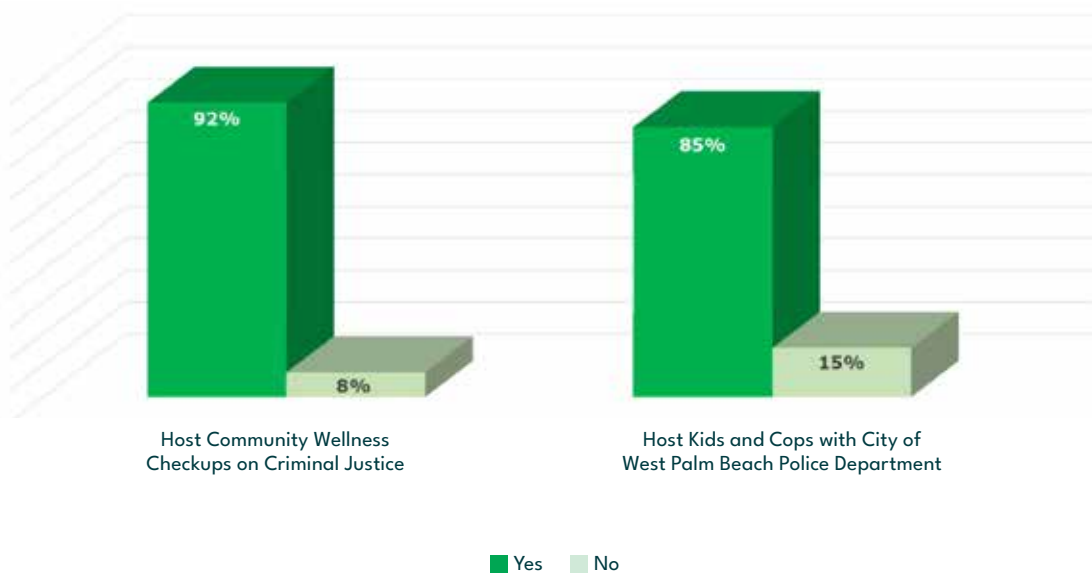
