MEETING MINUTES

I. WELCOME AND INTRODUCATIONS

Houston L. Tate, OCR Director, called the meeting to order at 10:01 a.m. and asked the Countywide Community Revitalization Team (CCRT) members and attendees to introduce themselves.

II. PRESENTATIONS

Cyndi Longley, Extension Program Manager, Palm Beach County Cooperative Extension Service

Ms. Longley provided a detailed presentation on Cooperative Extension's Family and Consumer Sciences: Discipline Areas.

• What is Cooperative Extension

Extension is a partnership between federal state, and county government. All 67 counties in Florida have an Extension office, with extension agent disciplines that are relevant to local needs and priorities. The University of Florida, in partnership with Florida A&M University (FAMU), administers the Florida Cooperative Extension program.

Research-based education and expertise is offered by trained professionals and volunteers to provide problem-solving information to Palm Beach County residents. We are supported by the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners, University of Florida, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

As the local UF/IFAS branch, the Palm Beach County Extension Department has access to the latest research and technology on different subjects of interest.

• PBC Extension Housing Data

- ✓ In 2020, we delivered 14 First-Time Home Buyer classes to 759 participants.
- ✓ Outcomes: 62% of participants (n=473) completed end-of-class evaluations. 97.6% (n= 461) of respondents reported learning how to increase credit score, how to determine their debt-to-income ratio, and how to calculate the amount of affordable rent or home purchase price.
- ✓ Outcomes: 62% of participants (n=473) completed end-of-class evaluations. 97.5% of respondents (n=461) reported that learned the process of purchasing a home by attending the class. 97.5% (n=461) also reported that they planned to comparison shop for mortgages using the knowledge of types of mortgages learned in the class.

• Nutrition and Food Safety

- Nutrition and Food Safety: Nutrition and food safety topics vary based on the need identified by our Palm Beach County residents and/or Family and Consumer Sciences Extension Agents.
- ✓ Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP): The EFNEP provides nutrition education to low-income families, particularly those making food-buying decisions for young children (birth-18). The EFNEP classes are series-based and consist of 6-8 week classes.

- ✓ Family Nutrition Program (FNP): The FNP in Palm Beach County works with low-income families. The FNP provides one-time and series-based nutrition education classes to seniors as well as series-based nutrition education to youth.

• Program Impacts: Nutrition Education

- ✓ EFNEP FY2019: The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) reached,
- ✓ 4,362 Palm Beach County residents;
- ✓ Outcomes: 93% showed improved diet quality indicators, 81% increased physical activity, 77% adopted food safety practices, 79% adopted recommend food resource management practices and 51% are more food secure.
- ✓ EFNEP FY2020: Taught 17 virtual events reaching 175 participants. Topics included: basic nutrition, food safety, food resource management, and promotion of physical activity.

- ✓ Outcomes: 596 program graduates with 95% improvement in one or more basic nutrition practice, 76% improving food safety practices.
- ✓ FNP FY2019:
 - Reached 6,675 unduplicated individuals.
 - FNP implemented Smarter Lunchrooms in 15 public schools.
 - FNP installed 6 gardens in various community settings.
 - FNP implemented a healthy vending machine and food recovery/food access rack at one site.
- ✓ FNP FY2020: 834 classes taught.
 - Outcomes: 4,248 youth taught reached, 344 adults, and 38 Policies, Systems, and Environmental Changes (PSEs) implemented.

- ✓ Work collaboratively with community partners to enhance current education needs in the community.

- Ike Powell, PBC Youth Services:

- The 2021 Summer Camp Scholarship Program is scheduled to begin on June 21. At this time, the only camp option for summer 2021 will be in-person attendance.
- Youth Services will offer extended hours to assist with applications on Tuesdays and Thursdays until 7 pm throughout the application period. In addition to extended hours, Youth Services will hold two outreach events to assist with applications.

Hybrid services are being offered in accordance with the CDC guidelines
- Samantha Corr, PBC ERM:
 - From March 17 24 ERM will be hosting guided hikes, focused on bird watching, reptiles, and kayaking adventure. This will be held at Limestone Creek, Winding Waters, and Hypoluxo. They hikes are free, but you must register.

 - There's an upcoming school modernization at Melaleuca Elementary school, on Gun Club Rd.
 - The district is continuing hybrid education with distance learning for students
 - New high school being built in unincorporated PBC south of Lake Worth Road, on Lyons Rd, scheduled to open August 2023.

 - The Library will be partnering with the Palm Beach County Food Bank to offer assistance with SNAP benefits. V. RESIDENT COMMENTS

Joseph Glucksman gave updates on McCurdy Senior Housing Corp. The Quiet Meadows project received awards which will allow them to move forward with 132 affordable rental properties for seniors and disabled adults. The project will located on the same campus as the Quiet Waters Senior Living apartments at 306 SW 10th St., Belle Glade, FL. The final award received from the Florida Housing Finance Corp. will guarantee that the new 34.5 million dollar project will be fully funded. Underwriting for the project will begin once a letter of invitation is received from the state of Florida. Within a year of receiving the invitation ground breaking should begin. This project is a partnership with the PBC Housing Authority. All residents of Quiet Meadows will receive a subsidy voucher.

PBC Housing Authority is reopening the waiting list for residency for Quiet Waters The waiting list will be open on Wednesday, February 17th and Thursday, February 18th from 9am-4pm only.

Mr. Glucksman stated that he will be sending information through Houston Tate for general circulation.
