# Message from the **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Fiscal year 2025 was a year of purposeful collaboration, thoughtful innovation, and measurable progress for the Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission (CJC). Guided by our mission to advance justice and enhance public safety, the commission continued to serve as a vital convener of stakeholders across systems, disciplines, and communities of Palm Beach County.

Throughout the year, the CJC brought together law enforcement leaders, judges, prosecutors, defenders, educators, behavioral health professionals, community advocates, and residents to examine complex challenges and develop practical, data-informed solutions. This collaborative approach remains the cornerstone of our work and the key to achieving sustainable outcomes across the criminal justice continuum.

Several accomplishments stand out this year. The CJC Bylaws Committee successfully modernized its bylaws for the first time since 2016, strengthening governance, accountability, and organizational clarity. The CJC Finance and Fundraising Committee worked to implement improved financial processes and enhanced transparency, positioning the CJC for long-term sustainability. The CJC task forces collectively advanced critical initiatives in behavioral health, court efficiency, community engagement, probation oversight, and law enforcement coordination,- each contributing to safer communities and a more effective justice system.

The CJC Community Engagement Task Force continued its focus through the launch of the inaugural CJC Justice Leadership Academy (JLA), marking a milestone in building community capacity and creating pathways for meaningful civic participation. Graduates of the JLA are already contributing their personal experience and JLA-enhanced leadership to CJC task forces, enriching the work and strengthening public trust. Similarly, the CJC Citizen's Criminal Justice Academy (CCJA) continued its long-standing legacy of educating residents about the justice system, fostering understanding, and building bridges between the community and justice partners. This year, the CJC, in partnership with the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, was able to hold the 47th, 48th, and 49th sessions of the CCJA.

The CJC also remained committed to using data to drive decision-making. From court process improvements and probation oversight to the work of the System Trends Review for Impartial Data Evaluation (STRIDE) Task Force, the focus on transparency and evidence-based practices helped inform policy recommendations and operational improvements. These efforts reinforce the belief that fairness, efficiency, and public safety are mutually reinforcing goals.

None of this work would be possible without the dedication of our commissioners, committee and task force members, justice partners, community volunteers, and CJC staff. More than 200 individuals generously contributed their time, expertise, and perspective this year. I am deeply grateful for their commitment and for the leadership of our chair, vice-chair, treasurer, the CJC Executive Committee, and the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners, whom we proudly serve in an advisory capacity.

As we look ahead to fiscal year 2026, the CJC remains focused on strengthening partnerships, expanding opportunities for community engagement efforts, advancing behavioral health and diversion strategies, affecting legislative change, and continuing to identify innovative approaches that improve outcomes across the justice system. Together, we will continue to advance justice, enhance safety, and work toward a criminal justice system that is fair, effective, and responsive to the needs of all who call Palm Beach County home.

# **CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION ADMINISTRATION**

## **Mission**

The CJC was established by county ordinance in 1988 to study all aspects of the criminal justice and crime prevention systems within the federal, state, county, municipal and private agencies within the county. This purpose shall include the study of the health and human services and educational systems, among others, as they pertain to criminal justice or crime prevention.

The 35-member CJC serves as an advisory commission to the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners.

- ▶ **18 public sector members** representing local, state, and federal criminal justice and governmental agencies.
- ▶ **17 private sector members, including:**
  - **Ten business leaders** nominated by the Economic Council of Palm Beach County and ratified by the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners (including one representative each from CareerSource Palm Beach County and the Health Care District of Palm Beach County).
  - **Two Chamber of Commerce representatives** (one representative each from the Black Chamber of Commerce of Palm Beach County and the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce of Palm Beach County).
  - **Five at-large members:** nominated by the CJC and ratified by the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners.
    - One clergy member.
    - One returning citizen.
    - One crime survivor.
    - One student (aged 17–22).
    - One at-large community member.

## **Objectives**

The CJC’s primary goal is to develop and recommend policies and programs to the Board of County Commissioners that:

- ▶ Ensure the coordination of law enforcement and crime prevention efforts in Palm Beach County;
- ▶ Ensure an efficient, just, and cost effective, criminal justice system in Palm Beach County; and
- ▶ Effect a long-term reduction in crime in Palm Beach County.

Law enforcement equipment, including Stop the Bleed Kits and Breach Kits was distributed by CJC staff in fiscal year 2025 to the Palm Beach Police Department and updated crime scene equipment to the Riviera Beach Police Department. Safety remains a priority in Palm Beach County, and both the Criminal Justice Commission CJC and its Law Enforcement Planning Council identified these resources as essential. This equipment enhances law enforcement efforts. The funding helps ensure that agencies with limited resources can obtain critical tools needed to protect their officers and the community.

**Purpose:** To review, develop, and maintain the governing rules (bylaws) that define how the organization operates. These bylaws outline the organization's structure, procedures, and the rights and responsibilities of its members, officers, and committees.

**Objective/Focus Areas:**

- **Review and Maintain:** Bylaws: Ensure the organization's bylaws remain accurate, up-to-date, and compliant with current laws, regulations, and organizational needs.
- **Recommend Amendments:** Propose changes or updates to the bylaws when needed, for example, to reflect organizational growth, changes in leadership structure, or new legal requirements.

As part of a broader modernization effort, the committee ensured that the bylaws reflect current organizational operations, governance standards, and legal requirements. The bylaws enhance clarity, align with the organization's current operations, and strengthen overall governance.

**Accomplishments and/or Impacts:** Successfully completed the adoption of the updated bylaws, which had last been revised in 2016. This initiative aimed to modernize the document, ensure compliance with current laws and organizational practices, and improve clarity in governance procedures. The updated bylaws better reflect the organization's current structure and operations, strengthen accountability, and provide a clear framework to guide future decision-making. The committee appreciates the input and collaboration of members throughout the review process and looks forward to maintaining the bylaws as a living document that supports the organization's continued growth and effectiveness.

**Anticipated Activity for the Upcoming Fiscal Year:** Monitor the implementation of the updated bylaws to ensure they are effectively guiding organizational operations. The committee will review any questions or challenges that arise regarding interpretation and provide clarifications as needed. Additionally, it will continue to identify areas where further revisions may be necessary to address evolving organizational needs, legal requirements, and/or governance best practices. These efforts aim to maintain a clear, consistent, and legally compliant framework that supports the organization's mission and strategic objectives.

The committee develops financial policies, reviews budgets, monitors expenditures, and identifies funding opportunities to advance the organizational mission.

**Objective/Focus Areas:**

- **Develop, Recommend, and Manage:** Budgeting, financial reporting, and long-term financial planning to maintain fiscal responsibility.

By diversifying funding sources and promoting effective financial management, the committee supports the organization’s sustainability and strategic goals.

**Number of Meetings Held:** Three

**Activity, Initiatives, and Outcomes:** Focused on strengthening financial management and increasing funding efficiency. Key activities included reviewing existing financial procedures, developing improved protocols for handling funding requests, and engaging partners to expand sponsorship and donation opportunities.

**Accomplishments and/or Impacts:** Successfully implemented new processes and procedures for managing funding requests, including sponsorships, donations, and intergovernmental transfers. These improvements streamlined the approval process, increased consistency in funding decisions, and enhanced tracking and reporting of financial contributions. The new system promotes greater accountability and ensures resources are allocated effectively to support the organization’s programs and strategic priorities.

**Anticipated Activity for the Upcoming Fiscal Year:** Continue strengthening financial sustainability and expanding resource development efforts by evaluating and refining the new funding request process, pursuing additional sponsorships and donor opportunities, and exploring intergovernmental and grant funding. Review and update financial policies as needed to ensure compliance, transparency, and alignment with best practices. These efforts will position the organization for long-term fiscal health and mission-driven growth.

**Anticipated Activity for the Upcoming Fiscal Year:** Create a program with eight juvenile bed capacity for those youth involved in domestic-related cases and complete Aware and Care 2.0 updates.

The Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners contracts with a private vendor, currently Professional Probation Services Inc. (PPS), to provide these services. The Probation Advisory Board (PAB) ensures that the contracted provider adheres to the terms of the contract with Palm Beach County and delivers quality services to misdemeanor offenders and the courts.

#### Objective/Focus Areas:

- **Contract Monitoring:** Conduct an annual programmatic review of misdemeanor probation operations with a focus on accuracy, timeliness, and level of compliance in services provided.
- **Data Analysis:** Examine the socio-demographic characteristics of misdemeanor probation consumers and perform random case file audits across all service provider offices to ensure standards are met.
- **Reporting:** Present review findings along with any recommendations to the CJC and the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners, facilitating informed decision-making and program improvement.
- **Communicating Findings:** Sharing of findings with the CJC and members of the criminal justice system to inform decision-making, policy development, and overall system improvements to promote public safety.

**Number of Meetings Held:** Four

#### Activity, Initiatives, and Outcomes:

- Improving data access, outcomes by way of electronic documentation from probation officers to the court for the closure of cases.
- Collaboration with misdemeanor probation services vendor to provide more details on programmatic needs of probationers (access to food, housing, education, mental, physical, emotional health, substance treatment, and more).
- PPS, will continue to expand their use of technology to capture and report out on data and will improve their overall system for better use starting at the beginning of 2026.

#### Accomplishments and/or Impacts:

- Higher levels of communication and cross-agency collaboration between criminal justice system stakeholders.
- Members of CJC staff, in conjunction with and approval of the PAB, completed the 2023-2024 Contract Monitoring Audit and provided recommendations to the full CJC to renew the contract option with PPS for an additional year. The full CJC adopted the recommendation provided by PAB.

# CJC HIGHLIGHTS, ACTIVITIES, AND INITIATIVES: CITIZEN'S CRIMINAL JUSTICE ACADEMY (CCJA)

## Citizen's Criminal Justice Academy

The CJC established the Citizen's Criminal Justice Academy (CCJA) in 1998 to educate the people of Palm Beach County about the criminal justice system. Subject matter experts volunteer their time to provide invaluable information on criminal justice at the local, county, and federal levels. A wide-ranging group of criminal justice professionals present information to residents. Sessions are held in partnership with the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office during the evening over a period of six to twelve weeks. Participants of the CCJA benefit from tours of the county courthouse, jail, and medical examiner's office. The 47th through 49th sessions of the CCJA were held during this fiscal year; one at the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, one at the West Palm Beach Police Department, and one in Belle Glade. All those aged 14 and older are welcome to apply and it is free for all participants. A certificate of participation is provided at the end of the CCJA.

## **CJC HIGHLIGHTS, ACTIVITIES, AND INITIATIVES: JUSTICE LEADERSHIP ACADEMY (JLA), COURT TEXT REMINDER SYSTEM, PUBLIC DEFENDER PROGRAM**

### **Justice Leadership Academy**

The CJC entered into a contract with Community Partners of South Florida in May 2024 to implement a community engagement model project to advance the work of the previous Dialogues to Change project. The model was designed to build community capacity and create sustainable impacts by reengaging Dialogues to Change participants to provide an educational base in civic engagement with the goal of CJC committee or task force membership.

### **Guiding Committee**

The CJC Community Engagement Guiding Committee (Guiding Committee) was established by consultant Jaime-Lee Bradshaw of Community Partners of South Florida to steer the formulation of the JLA and the establishment of participant selection criteria. The committee was comprised of key leaders representing various segments of the community. These members understood how integral it is to the success of a project of this nature to interpret and process information from various perspectives. The Guiding Committee met every two to three weeks over several months. The Guiding Committee members included:

The above members, with Ms. Bradshaw's guidance, formulated processes that ensured a successful approach, beginning with a survey of former participants and the collection of feedback for future participation. Additional assistance was provided, as needed, by Gwen Wright, Consultant to the MacArthur Foundation, Angelique J. Pickett, CJC Executive Director, Rosalind L. Murray, CJC Community Engagement Coordinator, and Katherine Hatos, CJC Criminal Justice Systems Manager. The Guiding Committee's role was to support the process leading to the CJC's first-ever Justice Leadership Academy, an educational experience designed to increase participants' understanding of the local criminal justice system and its policies and practices, preparing them to apply for a task force or committee. Onboarding and infusion activities were provided to facilitate relationship-building and strengthen connections between graduates and committee members.

Justice partners in attendance at the JLA graduation included re-entry services, the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office, the Public Defender, Judges, and other county and community-level providers.

### **Court Text Reminder System**

Since its implementation in November 2018, the Court Text Reminder System has played a significant role in reducing Failures to Appear (FTA) by sending defendants reminders of court dates and mandatory appointments with Pre-Trial Services.

Based on the successes of this program, as evaluated by Florida State University, the Palm Beach County Public Safety Department agreed to adopt this program beginning with FY2026. Management and funding of text reminder services will be conducted by Justice Services.

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### **Public Defender: Pre-Trial Services Placement Program**

The Public Defender's Pre-Trial Services Placement Program expanded its social services initiative via a contract through the CJC, focusing on connecting new and existing pre-trial clients to community-based resources. Started in 2017, this program was established to intersect individuals with key components necessary to create and maintain a stable life. Key components include housing, treatment, counseling, and workforce development opportunities. This program identifies clients at intake, with the goal of linking them to services to address immediate needs. This program will be funded through the Palm Beach County Public Safety Department for FY 2026.

"This session focuses on probation issues that affect jail populations. Participants will hear from probation departments in Brazoria County, TX, and Palm Beach County, FL, on their novel solutions. Palm Beach County developed a mobile probation unit to reduce violations, increase employment, address transportation challenges, and improve officer-client relationships. Brazoria is addressing new offenses in a different way to minimize revocations and warrants. **Purpose:** To monitor detention facility populations and develop recommendations to prevent overcrowding; evaluate pretrial and probation programs, work release programs, mental health programs, and substance abuse treatment programs; review gain-time and bail bond schedules and inmate confinement status; plan for future correctional needs; promote appropriate alternatives to incarceration where appropriate; and support successful offender reentry. The PSCC is also responsible for making a formal recommendation to the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners regarding how the Criminal Justice, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse Reinvestment Grant Program may best be implemented within a community.

### Objective/Focus Areas:

- **Recenter the Council:** To perform statutory authorities.
- **Review Legislation:** Develop practical, data-driven recommendations for CJC partners to consider in their criminal justice system related operations and/or policy review.
- **Research and Evaluate:** Determine the viability of creating a Jail Population Management Review Team.

**Number of Meetings Held:** Seven

**Anticipated Activity for the Upcoming Fiscal Year:** Grant application for the Criminal Justice, Mental Health, and Substance Abuse Reinvestment Grant Program. The Florida Department of Children and Families administers the Reinvestment Grant Program, which supports county efforts to enhance public safety, lower criminal justice costs, and expand access to treatment for individuals with mental health, substance use, or co-occurring disorders.
