DON'T KIT-NAP THIS KITTEN SEASON!

Kitten season has started again in sunny South Florida, and chances are good that tiny newborn kittens will be seen outdoors in bushes and protected places.

Don't touch those kittens – their lives depend on it!

Kittens are cute and tiny, but kitten season is a very difficult time for animal shelters. During early spring to late fall, cats mate and give birth to numerous kittens. It's that time of year that shelters across the nation dread.

Good Samaritans see these kittens and desperately want to help them. Here is the best way to help kittens when they are found.

- Watch closely Wherever there is a nest of newborn kittens, the mother cat isn't too far away. She most likely went to find food for herself, so she can continue to nurse her kittens until they are able to eat on their own.
- Once the mother has come back to her litter, some food and water for her can be set up far enough away from the nest so that it does not attract predators, but close enough so she can eat and get back to her kittens quickly.
- If after 24 hours the mother hasn't come back to her kittens, this is when they may need human intervention. Newborn kittens require round-the-clock care, but animal shelters may not have enough staff/fosters to care for these vulnerable newborn kittens.

When kittens are found, think of these questions:

- Where is mother?
- is she visible? If she is, leave food and water at a distance.
- If she is not seen, watch for 24 hours, and reach out to a local animal shelter for advice.

Kittens' best chance for survival is to stay with the mother. Her milk has antibodies that help the kittens grow and get strong. She also teaches her kittens important survival skills.

Once the kittens are 2 pounds or 2 months old, they are old enough for vaccines, spay/neuter surgery and adoption.
