Description:

Racial microaggressions are everyday insults, indignities, and demeaning messages directed towards Black, Indigenous, People of color (BIPOC) by typically well-intentioned people who are unaware of the hidden messages being sent to them (Sue et al., 2007). While seemingly small or insignificant, for BIPOC youth that experience these often and on a daily basis, there may be significant relational, emotional, and behavioral consequences. This intermediate presentation will define race-based implicit bias and microaggressions as well explore their impact on youth and those who work with youth. Finally, it will provide strategies for criminal justice professionals to increase awareness of implicit bias as well as to effectively respond to impacted youth within their care.

- 1) Define racial/ethnic microaggressions and implicit bias.
- 2) Describe the impact of implicit bias and racial microaggressions on the wellbeing of youth and those working with youth.
- 3) Identify ways to increase awareness of bias and effectively respond to youth of color who are impacted.

Presenter:



Danniella Jones, Psy.D. earned her bachelor's degree at Berry College in Rome, Georgia, with a major in Psychology and minor in Women's Studies. She earned her doctorate degree in clinical psychology at Spalding University in Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Jones completed her doctoral internship at Cherokee Health Systems, an integrated primary care and community mental health center in Knoxville, Tennessee and her post-doctoral fellowship with Palm Beach County Youth Services Department at Highridge Family Center. Dr. Jones is currently a psychologist at the Education and Training Center where she provides clinical supervision to doctoral trainees, conducts family and individual therapy as well as psychological evaluations. In addition, she is a certified PCIT therapist. Dr. Jones offers trainings and outreach to the community on topics related to trauma and equity. Dr. Jones has been featured and broadcasted on several local platforms such as WPEC CBS 12 news and PBC channel 20 news stations to provide information on racial and ethnic implicit bias and microaggressions. She was also interviewed on the People of Power podcast and has written blogs featured on the Children Service's Council EveryParent website and app discussing how to talk to children about race and racism. She has experience working as a victim advocate in a sexual assault/domestic violence shelter and as a therapist at a center that provides services for survivors of interpersonal trauma. Her professional interests include working with high risk, underserved, and diverse youth as well as with survivors of interpersonal trauma.
