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YOUTH SERVICES SUPERHEROES GATHER FOR ANNUAL EMPLOYEE RETREAT



On Thursday, August 3, Palm Beach County Youth Services Department held its sixth annual employee retreat at The Wellington Community Center. YSD's Seeds of Success Cross-Divisional Action Team coordinated and executed the event with a superhero theme to shed light on 'emotions being our superpowers' and the various superpowers YSD staff possess in their work towards serving youth and families in Palm Beach County. The superhero-themed retreat welcomed special guests, including County Administrator Verdenia Baker, Assistant County Administrator Dorritt M. Miller, County Appellate Practice Chief Attorney Helene Hvizd, and Keith Clinkscale and Marcela Millett from County Office of Financial Management and Budget.

Throughout the day, staff superheroes were immersed in a series of engaging activities. The Retreat started with celebrating the Youth Services Department 2023 'Employee of the Year,' Tevin Ali, Public Relations Specialist. Palm Beach County Administrator Verdenia Baker, Assistant County Administrator Dorritt Miller, and Director of Youth Services Department Tammy Fields presented the award to Tevin who received five nominations from the department. Tevin's nominators said, "Tevin demonstrates exemplary performance through work products, publications, attention to detail and design, and excellent communication skills. As YSD's Public Relations Specialist, Tevin's work is a crucial element to the success and networking power of the department. Collaboration and support for others is the hallmark of Tevin's work. Lending his expertise beyond our department, he champions community initiatives and young people throughout our region."

Following the Employee of the Year presentation, an interactive superhero-themed 'Menti' community check-in was conducted with staff to see which superhero symbolizes their feelings and whom they can call upon for help as their trusted sidekick. The YSD team then watched a captivating 'Year-in-Review' video to take in all the heroic work done by the department all year-round.

An inspiring "why my feelings are my superpower" video was shown with staff answering the questions "which superhero do you identify with" and "why are emotions your superpowers." The superhero team then transitioned into a fun interactive trivia game testing their knowledge of the Youth Services Department's various services, initiatives and programs.

All three Cross-Divisional Action Teams - Seeds of Success, Equity Diversity & Inclusion (EDI), and Sanctuary showcased their work with unique team-based activities, fostering a strong sense of camaraderie and collaboration. Before and during the superhero luncheon, participants enjoyed interactive activity tables hosted by Youth Services staff members and the Palm Beach County Wellness Center. The table exhibitions included engaging and wellness sessions on tessellation, innovations, stone artistry, guitar tutoring, origami, paraffin wax, chair massages, a scavenger hunt, and nutritious ingredients for overall well-being.

The afternoon session of the Retreat started with a presentation by the Program Evaluation team on the

analysis of the Youth Services Department's climate survey. Afterward, staff focused on leadership development and learning about their communication styles through an assessment and leadership training led by Tessie Watts, Chief Executive Officer and Leadership Consultant of The Leadership Haven Resource Center LLC. The session provided valuable insights and skills for the staff's personal and professional growth.

The Retreat provided the perfect opportunity for all attendees to unleash their unique superpowers and embrace their strengths, making it an unforgettable experience for the YSD team and attendees.

"Our department is spread throughout the county with seven different office locations. This retreat is our opportunity to come together as one team. Each member of staff is a superhero, and together we are mightier than the Justice League," said director Tammy K. Fields.



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HOW SANCTUARY IS INCORPORATING EQUITY, DIVERSITY, INCLUSION, & BELONGING (EDIB)



On September 5, 2023, the Sanctuary Institute hosted a Sanctuary Training at Youth Services titled "How Sanctuary is incorporating EDIB?"

The training was offered as optional for staff to participate in and was led by YSD's Sanctuary consultant, Aaron James. The discussion focused on how equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) and the Sanctuary are connected and why adding the B (belonging) to EDI is important.

Other topics of discussion included creating safe spaces, utilizing gratitude (kudos) to combat social trauma, awareness of microaggressions during conversation (i.e. Saying someone is assertive rather than aggressive), and utilizing coping plans before addressing a difficult topic.

SANCTUARY TRAINING FOR YOUTH SERVICES CORE TEAM AND SUPERVISORS



The Youth Services Department Sanctuary consultant, Aaron James, met with all Core Team members and Supervisors to identify any implementation

challenges the department has faced and help create solutions to address those challenges.

During the training, staff learned about common "potholes" that organizations face regarding the seven commitments then broke out into groups to identify these strengths and challenges specific to YSD.

Aaron also provided recommendations as YSD moves towards recertification, including how we update Youth Service's organizational trauma history, maintain fidelity, and address challenges related to staff turnover.

BIRTH TO 22: UTILIZING COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS TO ENRICH THE YOUTH MASTER PLAN 2.0





The Youth Master Plan (YMP) "Strengthening the Steps to Success" was launched by Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures in 2015 after holding 11 community conversations in the Palm Beach County community and surveying hundreds of youth. Six major areas of need were identified, and as

a result, Action Teams and Workgroups were created to address the needs and provide logistics support. As Birth to 22 approaches its 10-year anniversary, it is time to update the Youth Master Plan with the YMP 2.0.

As when the original version of the YMP was created, the alliance believes community collaboration is essential to maintain the standpoint of nothing about us, without us. Birth to 22 can only successfully provide support to our children, youth, and families after first hearing what gaps and concerns exist within our communities.

With the eleven community conversations held in the spring of 2023, Birth to 22 reached 222 youth and 180 adults. The alliance provided facts about the community and the strategic priority areas of mental health, economics, and education around youth transitioning to adulthood. The participants were asked about the needs, gaps, and recommendations related to these topics.

Next, Birth to 22 facilitated two Community Conversations targeting the community-based organizations that provide direct services to the youth and families. The first conversation was held virtually on August 23, 2023, with

27 participants. The second was held in-person at the Children's Services Council on September 6, 2023, with 28 participants. Conversation facilitator, Jeanette Gordon of McArthur's Own, guided the conversation with questions about the priority areas.

Finally, on September 19, 2023, a youth-led conversation was held at Vita Nova, an agency that is a safe bridge to independence for former foster care, LGBTQ, and other homeless youth. The youth were candid and open with their answers about resources, safety, and programs. They identified gaps in services, education, and support and provided recommendations and insight into programs that they find safe and impactful.

The spelling bee is for students enrolled in the Summer Camp Scholarship Program's participating camps and provides academic activities to encourage the spirit of learning while preventing summer slide. This was the first year the bee has been in person since 2019. In addition to the spelling bee, the event also included activities with Digital Vibez, Crazy Games, Palm Beach Behavioral Health Coalition, and the Palm Beach County Parks and Recreation Department. The final round also featured dance performances by Bethel Evangelical Church, Pahokee Dance Academy, and Ascension 33. "This year the Super Summer Spelling Bee returned to an in-person event. It allowed us to engage all of our campers in fitness, competition, and academics. The top three spellers in each category showed off their hard work in the final round on stage in front of their peers. They received trophies, books, gift cards, and tons of applause," said Valerie Messineo, Palm Beach County Youth Services Department Senior Program Specialist. 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HIGHRIDGE FAMILY CENTER PARTNERS WITH WEST PALM BEACH POLICE DEPARTMENT

On July 18, 2023, Highridge Family Center and the West Palm Beach Police Department re-launched a joint initiative aimed to bridge the divide between law enforcement and community members. The Community Engagement Team, comprised of four officers and a community clergy member, facilitated weekly discussions on topics such as respect, safety, anger management, and decision-making. Residents and officers had the opportunity to engage in conversations they might not otherwise have in the community. Residents were able to ask questions and express opinions and concerns. Some discussions veered off script, as is expected when adolescents are involved. Yet, this neither deterred nor detracted from the greater mission---building a bridge.

Over ten weeks, we've seen very scared, nervous, reluctant, wary, or suspicious residents become more comfortable and open to the intervention and the officers. In getting to know the individuals behind the badge and uniform as fathers, husbands, sons, and brothers, they became people like themselves and their

families. Highridge facilitated a safe space for open and respectful exchange, to challenge assumptions, and to vet narratives that hinder other possibilities. We hope this positive experience was meaningful for all participants: residents, staff, and officers as we forge ahead.

A special thank you to the dorm counselors and therapists who provided support and encouragement to the residents along the way.

YOUTH SERVICES INTERN CONTINUES TO REPRESENT STUDENT VOICES IN TALLAHASSEE

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For The Children Inc. A place where children come first

CBA Q&A: FOR THE CHILDREN INC.

What is your mission?

To provide low-income families with children ages 3-19 with quality and affordable educational, recreational, and family support services that foster positive physical, social, emotional, and cognitive growth and development.

Q

What does your organization do?

To fulfill its mission, For The Children (FTC) has been providing an integrated youth-centered approach to development that has yielded a robust Return on Investment (ROI) and renders solid short-term goals and a longterm impact in our marginalized communities. To accomplish this, FTC has focused on supporting academic goals in conjunction with the Palm Beach County School District; providing enrichment activities whose purpose is to help youth stay interested in learning; providing a holistic approach to well-being that keeps youth physically and emotionally healthy; familiarizing youth with governance and opportunities provides for leadership sparing them from the Juvenile Justice system; and with an open door policy, FTC became the center of a community where people become neighbors and, in turn, turn into a large family.

This way, "a place where children are first" was created, and a

"village" is responsible for raising each child/youth under our care.

What key programs does your organization offer?

Our main programs include:

The Kids Zone

This space was designed to ensure children between the ages 3 to 5, are socially, emotionally, and academically prepared to enter kindergarten. We offer programs that allow them to explore the worlds of art, science, math, music, languages, and more in a safe, nurturing environment.

The Youth Zone was planned to increase educational success of children, ages 5-12, by creating environments where learning is fun and attending school is the norm.

It includes:

• Academics: In addition of homework assistance, the program offers academic enrichment and peer-to-peer mentoring.

• Multicultural arts program: It concentrates on drawing, painting, photography, video production, drumming and performing arts among others.

• Recreational Activities: Provides flag football, martial arts, musical theater, volleyball, basketball, computer literacy, poetry writing, tennis and video games and more.

• Social Activities: give access to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and

Key Club (Lake Worth Kiwanis) memberships.

The Teen Zone

It is composed of the Youth Empowerment Center (YEC) and Teen Learning Center (TLC). They offer:

Academics

YEC offers daily homework assistance, and small group tutoring in reading and math.

TLC operates at Lake Worth Community High and Boynton Beach High School and presents free ACT, FSA, and SAT Prep.

Career Exploration: The Teen Zone offers teens opportunities including, career exploration, "teen-preunership," summer employment, and jobs shadowing.
Life Skill and Developmental Tasks including understanding self and personal values, abilities dealing with family stress, nutrition, human growth and development, and issues related to social and emotional transitions from adolescence to adulthood.

Leadership Development:

Youngsters are trained as peer mentors to support children ages 3-8 by assisting in small group enrichment activities and other program-related tasks in the classroom.

Participants run a "Youth Council" and meet twice monthly to address issues such as neighborhood cleanups, fundraising events, community service learning projects, and other activities.

How does your agency benefit the community?

Education:

One of our main contributions to the community is to make sure that in marginalized populations, FTC's participants do not lag behind. Therefore, one of our major contributions is achieving our promise of leading our children to success measured by meeting our academic objectives:

Goals Met:

• At least 99% of children attending the Kids Zone, meet the Florida learning and developmental standards for school readiness moving to kindergarten on time.

- The academic promotion rate of at least 97% indicates that our youth keep not just a standard score but numerous students excel in school obtaining cumulative averages of A and B.
- One hundred percent of our youth graduate on time.
- Long Term Impact

• At least 90% of our Teen Zone program's interns either move on to college, or are employed after high school graduation.

• Our notable alumni contribute to many professional and entrepreneurship careers, elevating the economic standards of their communities. They are scientists, renowned performers, nurses, teachers, bankers, and entrepreneurs, to name a few.

What is your agency's focus for 2023?

FTC main focus of 2023-2024 is to bring all the programs to a single site. Construction will take place at the Historical Osborne School's location. This one will be refurbished, while the other two structures will be built to accommodate administrative offices, programs, a community center, and some amenities.

How do the funds received from Palm Beach County enhance the services your agency provides?

The Palm Beach County Youth Services Department helps fund For the Children (FTC). The funds are used for the critical support of the center, including utilities and staff salaries. We are so grateful for this funding as it allows us to consistently provide a safe, stable, and nurturing environment for our students. In addition, with funds from Palm Beach County, FTC has changed not only behaviors but also the social context of a community. As both adults and



children learned about their personal responsibility regarding well-being by changing eating habits, exercise, and mindfulness, parents expanded their knowledge of other cultures. They learned that there are more options beyond their traditional ones.
